

## **Overview**

This report is the seventh quarterly report during the NDIS Transition period, which commenced on 1 July 2016.





## **Summary**

## Participants and Planning

6,428 additional participants with plans this quarter.

As at 31 March 2018, plans approved and ECEI referrals represent:

- 74% of year to date bilateral estimate met (1 July 2017 31 March 2018)
- 77% of scheme to date bilateral estimate met (1 July 2013 - 31 March 2018)

Satisfaction rating remained high with 93% of participants surveyed in the quarter rating their satisfaction with the Agency's planning process as either good or very good.

## **Committed Supports and Payments**

\$1.2 billion has been paid to providers and participants since Scheme inception.

#### Overall.

- 61% of committed supports were utilised in 2013-14,
- 79% in 2014-15,
- 79% in 2015-16,
- 67% in 2016-17. 2017-18 experience is still emerging.

Lower utilisation in 2016-17 is predominantly driven by the large number of participants who received their first plan in this year. Participants utilise less of their first plan compared with their second and subsequent plans, as it takes time to familiarise with the NDIS and decide which supports to use.

### **Providers and Markets**

4,177 approved providers, a 14% increase for the quarter.

80-90% of payments made by the NDIA are received by 25% of providers.

38% of service providers are individual/sole traders.

### **Mainstream Interface**

87% of active participants with a plan approved in 2017-18 Q3 access mainstream services.

## **Participants and Planning**

As the transition phase to full scheme continues, the NDIS in Victoria continues to grow with 6,428 additional participants with approved plans this quarter.





## **Summary**

The NDIS is transitioning to full-scheme according to phasing schedules bilaterally agreed by State/Territory and Commonwealth governments.




## **Quarterly Intake**

### 2017-18 Q3

Of the 7,242 participants deemed 'eligible' this quarter 66% entered from an existing State/Territory program.

Of the 6,428 plan approvals this quarter, 78% had transitioned from an existing State/Territory program, 91% entered with a permanent disability and 809 were previously confirmed as ECEI at 2017-18 Q2.





## Quarterly Intake Detail

### Plan approvals as at 31 March 2018


Plan approval numbers have increased from 25,112 at the end of 2017-18 Q2 to 31,540 by the end of 2017-18 Q3, an increase of 6,428 approvals.

As at 31 March 2018 there were 2,210 children with a confirmed ECEI referral bringing the total number to 33,750. Overall, 468 participants with approved plans have exited the Scheme.

Of the 2,210 children with a confirmed ECEI referral as at 31 March 2018, 1,081 were previously confirmed as ECEI at 31 December 2017 and an additional 1,129 entered the gateway this quarter.

In the quarter of 2017-18 Q3 there were 5,205 plan reviews. This figure relates to all participants who have entered the scheme.

## Cumulative Position

### Plan approvals as at 31 March 2018


As at the end of 2017-18 Q3, the cumulative total number of participants receiving support was 33,750 (including 2,210 children supported through the ECEI gateway). Of these, 21,584 transitioned from an existing State/Territory program and 2,959 transitioned from an existing Commonwealth program.

In addition, 10,018 participants were awaiting a plan as at 31 March 2018.

Overall, since 1 July 2013, there have been 48,260 people with access decisions.

Cumulative position reporting is inclusive of trial participants for the reported period and represents participants who have or have had an approved plan.



## Plan approvals by participant referral pathway






# Participant Profiles by Age Group

Demographic profile of active participants with a plan approved in 2017-18 Q3, compared with plan approvals as at 31 December 2017, by age group.


Approximately 18% of participants entering in this quarter are aged 0 to 6 years. This is higher compared to 16% in prior quarters.

Further, 16% of participants entering in this quarter are aged 7 to 14 years. This is lower compared to 20% in prior quarters.




# Participant Profiles by Disability Group

Demographic profile of active participants with a plan approved in 2017-18 Q3, compared with plan approvals as at 31 December 2017, by disability group.


27% of participants entering in the quarter of 2017-18 Q3 have a primary disability group of Intellectual Disability. This is lower compared to prior quarters.

# Participant Profiles by Level of Function


Demographic profile of active participants with a plan approved in 2017-18 Q3, compared with plan approvals as at 31 December 2017, by level of function.

For participants with a plan approval in the current quarter:

- 30% of active participants had a relatively high level of function
- 43% of active participants had a relatively moderate level of function
- 27% had a relatively low level of function

These relativities are within the NDIS participant population, and not comparable to the general population.

■ % of active participants with a plan approved in prior quarters



# Participant Profiles by Gender

Demographic profile of active participants with a plan approved in 2017-18 Q3, compared with plan approvals as at 31 December 2017, by gender.

The majority of participants are males.





## Participant Profiles

Demographic profile of active participants with a plan approved in 2017-18 Q3, compared with plan approvals as at 31 December 2017.

Of the participants with a plan approved in 2017-18 Q3:

- 2.3% were Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander, compared with 2.2% for prior periods.
- 0.9% were young people in residential aged care, compared with 1.4% for prior periods.
- 6.8% were culturally and linguistically diverse, compared with 5.8% for prior periods.





## Plan Management Support Co-ordination


The proportion of participants who are fully or partly self-managing their plan was higher in 2017-18 Q3 (25%) compared with prior quarters of transition (23%).

50% of participants who have had a plan approved in 2017-18 Q3 have support coordination in their plan, compared with 44% in prior quarters during transition.


### **Support Co-ordination**

### **Plan Activation**

Plan activation refers to the amount of time between plan approval and the commencement of the participant receiving support.


The percentage of plans activated within 90 days of approval were:

- 78% of plans approved in prior quarters
- 74% of plans approved in 2017-18 Q1.


Plan activation can only be approximated using data on payments. As there is a lag between when support is provided and payments made, these statistics are likely to be conservative. That is, it is likely that plan activation is faster than presented. Further, in-kind supports have been excluded from the calculation, which further contributes to the conservative figures.




## Participant Outcomes

Baseline outcome measures were collected from 99% of participants receiving their initial plan since 1 July 2016.

- 65% of participants aged 0 to before school are able to make friends outside of family/carers, compared to 61% of participants from school age to 14
- 55% of participants aged 0 to before school are engaged in age appropriate community, cultural or religious activities, compared to 31% 36% for other age groups
- 55% of participants from school age to 14 attend school in a mainstream class, compared to 25% of participants aged 15 to 24
- 24% of participants aged 25 and over have a paid job, compared to 16% of participants aged 15 to 24
- 64% of participants aged 25 and over choose what they do every day, compared to 39% of participants aged 15 to 24

### Selected key baseline indicators for participants






## Family/Carers Outcomes

The percentage of participants' family/carers:

- working in a paid job was highest for participants aged 15 to 24 (47%)
- able to advocate for their child/family member was highest for participants aged 0 to 14 (76%)
- who have friends and family they can see as often as they like was highest for participants aged 25 and over (45%)
- who feel in control selecting services was highest for participants aged 25 and over (42%)
- who support/plan for their family member through life stage transitions was highest for participants aged 0 to 14 (85%)

# Has the NDIS helped? Participants


Perceptions of whether the NDIS has helped.

Participants who entered the Scheme in the first three quarters of 2016-17 and had a plan review approximately one year later were asked questions about whether the NDIS had helped them.

The percentage responding 'Yes' was highest for the domain of:

- Daily Living (90%), for participants aged 0 to before school
- Daily Living (52%), for participants of school age to 14
- Daily Living (62%), for participants aged 15 to 24
- Daily Living (70%), for participants aged 25 and over

### "Has the NDIS helped?" questions for participants






# Has the NDIS helped? Family/Carers

Perceptions of whether the NDIS has helped.

Families and carers of participants who entered the Scheme in the first three quarters of 2016-17 and had a plan review approximately one year later were asked questions about whether the NDIS had helped them.

The NDIS has helped families and carers of participants most with life stage transitions and with feeling supported.

■ 0 to 14 ■ 15 and over




## **Participant Satisfaction**

93% of participants rated their satisfaction with the Agency's planning process as either good or very good in the current quarter. This has increased since the last quarter.

The Participant Pathway Review aims to improve the participant experience.

Participant satisfaction continues to be high, but has dropped during transition, compared with trial site experience. Proportion of participants describing satisfaction with the Agency's planning process as good or very good - by quarter

## **Committed Supports and Payments**

Both committed and paid supports to participants are increasing in line with the growing scheme.

To date funding committed to participants with an approved plan amounts to \$2.9 billion (including support periods in the future), of which \$1.2 billion has been paid.

# **Committed Supports** and Payments






# **Committed Supports by Cost Band**


A lower proportion of initial plan approvals in 2017-18 Q3 have average annualised committed supports between \$15,000 and \$30,000 compared with participants who entered in prior quarters when participants with shared supported accommodation (SSA) supports are included.

This is also the case when SSA participants are excluded.

■ As at Q2 2017-18 ■ Q3 2017-18




# **Committed Supports by Age Band**

Average annualised committed supports increase steeply up to age 19, stabilises to age 64 and then reduces at older ages.

The average annualised committed supports was lower in 2017-18 Q3 compared to previous quarters for most age groups.

### Average annualised committed supports by age band





# **Committed Supports by Disability Group**




# **Committed Supports by Level of Function**

The average annualised committed supports generally increase for participants with lower levels of function.

The average annualised committed supports for participants with an initial plan approval in 2017-18 Q3 is lower compared with participants who entered in prior quarters for participants across low, medium and high levels of function.




# **Utilisation of Committed Supports**

Utilisation of committed supports by year that the support was expected to be provided as at 31 December 2017, compared with 31 March 2018.

As there is a lag between when support is provided and when it is paid, the utilisation in 2017-18 will increase.

The utilisation of committed supports in 2017-18 YTD is still emerging and the utilisation rate is expected to increase as there is a lag between when support is provided and when it is paid.



## **Providers and Markets**

The scale and extent of the market continues to grow, with a 14% increase in the number of providers during the quarter to 4,177.





## **Summary**

This section contains information on registered service providers and the market, with key provider and market indicators presented.

### **Provider registration**

- To provide supports to NDIS participants, a service provider is required to register and be approved by the NDIA.
- Providers register with the NDIA by submitting a registration request, indicating the types of support (registration groups) they are accredited to provide.

How providers interact with participants

- NDIS participants have the flexibility to choose the providers who support them.
- Providers are paid for disability supports and services provided to the participants.




## Providers over time

As at 31 March 2018, there were 4,177 registered service providers of which 1,600 were individual/sole trader operated business while the remaining 2,577 providers were registered as a company or organisation.

The number of approved service providers increased by 14% from 3,662 to 4,177 in the quarter.




## Proportion of Active Providers

Change in the activity status of providers.

As at 31 March 2018, 48% of providers have been active and 52% were yet to have evidence of activity. Of the overall stock of providers, 616 providers began delivering new supports in the quarter.


# **Approved Registration** groups

The number of approved providers has increased for most registration groups over the quarter.

Therapeutic Supports has the highest number of approved service providers and has seen a 14% increase since the previous quarter.

The largest percentage increase in approved providers was for the Specialised Disability Accommodation registration group in the quarter, increasing from 131 as at 31 December 2017 to 160 as at 31 March 2018. This was followed by Innovative Community Participation, Vehicle Modifications and Household Tasks.





■ As at 31 March 2018 ■ As at 31 December 2017




# Active Registration groups

The number of active providers in each registration group has increased for most registration groups over the quarter.

Therapeutic Supports has the highest number of active service providers and has seen a 21% increase since the previous quarter.

The largest percentage increase in active providers was for the Innovative Community Participation registration group in the quarter, increasing from 190 as at 31 December 2017 to 241 as at 31 March 2018. This was followed by Interpreting and translation, Assistive products for household tasks and Community nursing care for high needs.


The proportion of participants entering in the current quarter accessing mainstream services is consistent with prior quarters.






### **Mainstream Interface**
