

Overview

This report is the fifth quarterly report during the NDIS Transition period, which commenced on 1 July 2016.





Summary

Participants and Planning

As at 30 September 2017, there were 19,506 participants with approved plans (including children in the ECEI gateway).

As at 30 September 2017, plans approved and ECEI referrals represent:

- 92% of year to date bilateral estimate met (1 July 2017 30 September 2017)
- 77% of transition to date bilateral estimate met (1 July 2016 - 30 September 2017)
- 82% of scheme to date bilateral estimate met (1 July 2013 - 30 September 2017)

74% of participants surveyed in the quarter rated their satisfaction as good or very good. This is slightly lower than in previous quarters.

Committed Supports and Payments

\$1.7 billion of supports has been committed to 18,826 participants. This includes \$905.2 million of supports in respect of prior financial years including trial, \$733.6 million of supports in respect of 2017-18^ and \$46.3 million of supports in respect of later years*.

\$760.8 million has been paid to providers and participants.

Overall, 61% of committed supports were utilised in 2013-14, 79% in 2014-15 and 80% in 2015-16. Currently utilisation is 66% in 2016-17, although this will likely increase as there is a lag between when support is provided and when it is paid.

Providers and Markets

3,101 approved providers, a 22% increase during the quarter.

75-90% of payments made by the NDIA are received by 25% of providers.

37% of services providers are individual/sole traders.

Mainstream Interface

88% of active participants with a plan approved in 2017-18 Q1 access mainstream services.

The proportion of participants entering in the current quarter accessing mainstream services is higher compared to prior quarters.

Participants and Planning

As the transition phase to full scheme continues, the NDIS in Victoria continues to grow with 3,393 additional participants with approved plans this quarter.

680 children were in the ECEI gateway at 30 September 2017. Of these, 353 were previously confirmed as ECEI at 30 June 2017 and an additional 327 entered the gateway this quarter.





Participants and Planning

The NDIS is transitioning to full-scheme in line with phasing schedules bilaterally agreed by State/Territory and Commonwealth governments.


Quarterly Intake

2017-18 Q1

Of the 6,146 participants deemed 'eligible' this quarter 80% entered from an existing State/Territory program.

Of the 3,393 plan approvals this quarter, 57% had transitioned from an existing State/Territory program and 86% entered with a permanent disability.

Overall, since 1 July 2013, there have been 30,581 people with access decisions, and 19,506 participants with an approved plan (including children in the ECEI gateway).



Note: Of the 3,393 initial plans approved this quarter, 342 were previously confirmed as ECEI at 30 June 2017.

Plan approvals as at 30 September 2017


Plan approval numbers have increased from 15,433 at the end of 2016-17 Q4 to 18,826 by the end of 2017-18 Q1, an increase of 3,393 approvals.

As at 30 September 2017 there were 680 children with a confirmed ECEI referral bringing the total number to 19,506. Overall, 291 participants with approved plans have exited the Scheme.

Of the 680 children with a confirmed ECEI referral as at 30 September 2017, 353 were previously confirmed as ECEI at 30 June 2017 and an additional 327 entered the gateway this quarter.

In the quarter of 2017-18 Q1 there were 2,347 plan reviews. This figure relates to all participants who have entered the scheme (including transition).

Cumulative Position


Plan approvals as at 30 September 2017

As at the end of 2017-18 Q1, the cumulative total number of participants receiving support was 19,506 (including 680 children supported through the ECEI gateway). Of these, 11,544 transitioned from an existing State/Territory program and 1,798 transitioned from an existing Commonwealth program.

In addition, 9,165 participants were awaiting a plan as at 30 September 2017.

Cumulative position reporting is inclusive of trial participants for the reported period and represents participants who have or have had an approved plan.



Plan approvals by participant referral pathway







Demographic profile of active participants with a plan approved in the quarter of 2017-18 Q1, compared with plan approvals as at 30 June 2017.

% of active participants with a plan approved by age group






Demographic profile of active participants with a plan approved in the quarter of 2017-18 Q1, compared with plan approvals as at 30 June 2017.


Demographic profile of active participants with a plan approved in the quarter of 2017-18 Q1, compared with plan approvals as at 30 June 2017.

For participants with a plan approval in the current period:

- 35% of active participants had a relatively high level of function
- 42% of active participants had a relatively moderate level of function
- 23% had a relatively low level of function

These relativities are within the NDIS participant population, and not comparable to the general population.


Plan Management Support Co-ordination

The proportion of participants who are fully or partly self-managing their plan was higher in 2017-18 Q1 (24%) compared with the prior quarters of 2016-17 (16%), and 46% of participants who have had a plan approved in 2017-18 Q1 have support coordination in their plan, compared with 59% in prior quarters of 2016-17.


Support Co-ordination

Plan Activation


Plan activation refers to the amount of time between plan approval and the commencement of the participant receiving support.

The percentage of plans activated within 90 days of approval were:

- 81% of plans approved in 2016-17 Q1
- 75% of plans approved in 2016-17 Q2
- 79% of plans approved in 2016-17 Q3
- 71% of plans approved in 2016-17 Q4

Plan activation can only be approximated using data on payments. As there is a lag between when support is provided and payments made, these statistics are likely to be conservative. That is, it is likely that plan activation is faster than presented. Further, in-kind supports have been excluded from the calculation, which further contributes to the conservative figures.

Participant Outcomes

Baseline outcome measures were collected from 97% of participants receiving their initial plan since 1 July 2016.

Of participants aged 25 and over:

- 53% choose who supports them
- 64% want more choice and control in their life
- 77% are happy with their home and feel safe or very safe there
- 34% were actively involved in a community group in the past year

For family/carers of children aged 0 to 14:

- 43% have a paid job
- 38% say they are able to work as much as they want
- 41% say they are able to see family and friends as much as they want

Participant Outcomes

Key measures on baseline social, economic and independence outcomes. These will be monitored into the future.


Participants aged 0 to before school:

- 64% were able to make friends outside of family/carers
- 54% involved in age appropriate community, cultural or religious activities (highest compared with other age groups)

Participants aged 25 and over:

- 23% had a paid job
- 63% choose what they do every day

Participant Outcomes


Responses to the "Has the NDIS helped?" questions.

Participants who entered the Scheme in 2016-17 Q1 and had their plan reviewed in 2017-18 Q1 were asked questions about whether the NDIS had helped them.

Percentage of participants responding "Yes" were:

- Higher for 0 to school age participants, particularly for daily living (83%)
- Lower for the school to 14 age group
- Lower for older adult age group than for the younger adult age group

"Has the NDIS helped?" questions





Participant Satisfaction

74% of participants rated their satisfaction with the Agency planning process as either good or very good in the current quarter. This has decreased since the last quarter.

The Participant Pathway Review aims to improve the participant experience.

Participant satisfaction continues to be high, but has dropped during transition, compared with trial site experience. Proportion of participants describing satisfaction with the agency as good or very good - by quarter

Both committed and paid supports to participants are increasing in line with the growing scheme.

To date funding committed to participants with an approved plan amounts to \$1.7 billion (including support periods in the future), of which \$760.8 million has been paid.

The \$1.7 billion committed support includes \$905.2 million of supports in respect of prior financial years including trial, \$733.6 million of supports in respect of 2017-18^ and \$46.3 million of supports in respect of later years*.



A lower proportion of initial plan approvals in 2017-18 Q1 have average annualised committed supports greater than \$15,000 compared with participants who entered in prior quarters when participants with shared supported accommodation (SSA) supports are included.


This is also the case when SSA participants are excluded.

Increase in the lower committed support bands are likely due to the high number of children who entered in the quarter.

■ As at Q4 2016-17 ■ Q1 2017-18




Average annualised committed supports increase steeply up to age 19, stabilises to age 64 and then reduces at older ages.

Average annualised committed supports has decreased in the current quarter for participants at most ages. This is reflective of the phasing schedule, with a higher proportion of new and Commonwealth participants in the most recent quarter.

For participants aged 65+, their average annualised committed supports has been higher in the current quarter due to the entry of participants in shared supported accommodation.

Average annualised committed supports by age band




Note: The age eligibility requirements for the NDIS are based on the age as at the access request date. Participants with their initial plan approved aged 65+ have turned 65 since their access request was received.



Participants with Spinal Cord Injury, Cerebral Palsy and Intellectual Disability have the highest average annualised committed supports while participants with Developmental Delay, Hearing Impairment and Other Sensory/Speech have the lowest average annualised committed supports.

There was mixed experience in the most recent quarter for average annualised committed supports by disability type. Participants with stroke and spinal cord disabilities had higher average annualised committed supports for plans approved in 2017-18 Q1 compared to plans approved in prior quarters, while there were lower average annualised cost for participants with autism and intellectual disability.

Average annualised committed supports by primary disability group





The average annualised committed supports generally increase for participants with lower levels of function.

The average annualised committed supports for participants with an initial plan approval in 2017-18 Q1 is lower compared with participants who entered in prior quarters for participants across low, medium and high levels of function.

Note 1: Average annualised committed supports are not shown if there are insufficient data in the group.



Utilisation of committed supports by year that the support was expected to be provided as at 30 June 2017, compared with 30 September 2017.

As there is a lag between when support is provided and when it is paid, the utilisation in 2016-17 and 2017-18 will increase, the latter significantly so. Utilisation for 2016-17 and 2017-18 is emerging at lower levels than in 2014-15 and 2015-16.

The utilisation of committed supports has increased for supports provided in 2016-17. This is due to payments in 2017-18 Q1 for supports which were provided during 2016-17.



The scale and extent of the market continues to grow, with a 22% increase in the number of providers during the quarter to 3,101.





This section contains information on registered service providers and the market, with key provider and market indicators presented.

Provider registration

- To provide supports to NDIS participants, a service provider is required to register and be approved by the NDIA.
- Providers register with the NDIA by submitting a registration request, indicating the types of support (registration groups) they are accredited to provide.
- Providers are approved to deliver disability supports and services to participants of the NDIS if they have at least one registration group approved.

How providers interact with participants

- NDIS participants have the flexibility to choose the providers who support them.
- Providers are paid for disability supports and services provided to the participants.






Increase in number of providers over time.

As at 30 September 2017, there were 3,101 registered service providers of which 1,132 were individual/sole trader operated business while the remaining 1,969 providers were registered as a company or organisation.










Change in the activity status of providers.

As at 30 September 2017, 39% of providers were active in the last quarter, 56% were yet to have evidence of activity and 5% were inactive. Of the overall stock of providers, 475 providers began delivering new supports in the quarter.


Registration groups

The increase in approved providers from 30 June 2017 to 30 September 2017 varies by registration group.

Therapeutic Supports has the highest number of approved service providers and has seen a 23% increase since the previous quarter.

The largest percentage increase in approved providers was for the Interpreting and translation registration group in the quarter, increasing from 132 as at 30 June 2017 to 211 as at 30 September 2017. This was followed by Assistance with Animals, Community nursing care for high needs and Specialised Disability Accommodation.

Approved providers by registration group and percentage change over the quarter






Market share of top providers


The proportion of participants entering in the current quarter accessing mainstream services is higher compared to prior quarters.






Mainstream Interface

88% of active participants with a plan approved in 2017-18 Q1 access mainstream services, an increase from prior quarters. Participants are accessing mainstream services predominantly for health and wellbeing, lifelong learning and daily activities.
