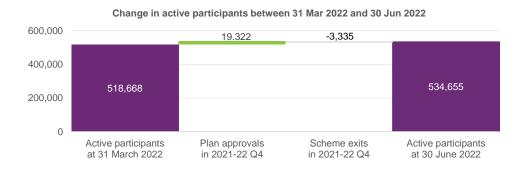

Performance summary:

- 565,560 participants (excluding children accessing early connections) have had an approved plan since July 2013. 534,655 of these continue to be active.
- 313,971 active participants have not previously received disability support via State and Commonwealth government programs in the past.
- In the current quarter, 19,322 participants have entered the Scheme and there are 13,940 children accessing early connections at the end of June 2022.
- 103,269 plans have been reviewed this quarter.
- 25,717 access decisions have been made in the quarter, of which 19,437 met access and are still active.
- 1,762 (9.1%) of the new active participants this quarter identified as Indigenous, taking the total number of Indigenous participants nationally to 38,846 (7.3%).
- 1,792 (9.3%) of the new active participants this quarter are Culturally and Linguistically Diverse (CALD) 4, taking the total number of CALD participants nationally to 49,201 (9.2%).

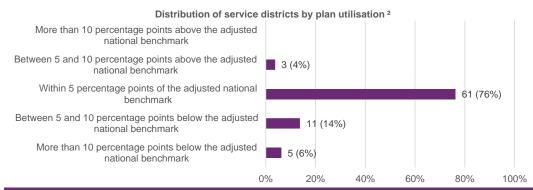

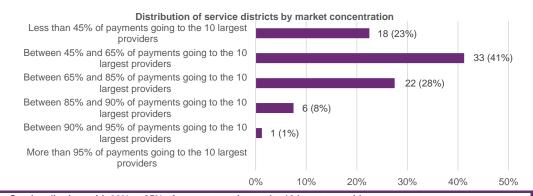
³ The NDIA's new participant check-in process ensures that every scheduled review begins with a contact from the planner or partner to discuss review options well before any scheduled review date. Plans are extended automatically if they have not been reviewed before expiry so participants have continuity of support.

- Total annualised plan budgets at 30 June 2022 were \$36,803m and payments from 1 July 2021 were \$27,627m.
- The number of active providers at the end of June is 18,347, growing by 2% in the quarter.
- Utilisation was 9% from 1 October 2021 to 31 March 2022, with no service district in Australia more than 10 percentage points from the adjusted national benchmark.
- In 9% (7 out of 80) of service districts, the top 10 providers provide more than 85% of payments.





Service districts more than 10% below plan utilisation benchmark:

- NT East Arnhem: 47% vs 69% benchmark
- SA Far North (SA): 52% vs 73% benchmark
- NT Darwin Remote: 50% vs 65% benchmark
- WA Kimberlev-Pilbara: 56% vs 69% benchmark
- OA Francisch IM catama 000/ ca 700/ barraharan
- SA Eyre and Western: 60% vs 72% benchmark

Service districts with 90% to 95% of payments going to the 10 largest providers:

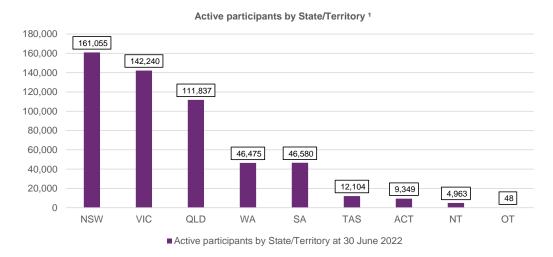
² The 'benchmark' in this analysis is the national average after adjusting for the proportion of participants in supported independent living in each service district and the length of time participants have been in the Scheme.

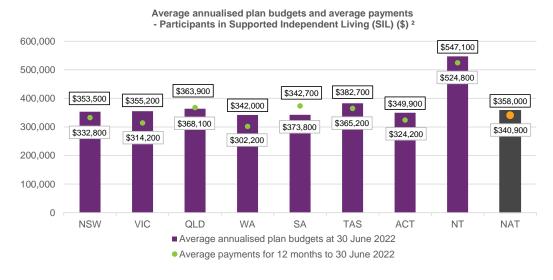
³ Total plan inflation consists of plan budget changes occurring at plan review, as well as changes occurring within a plan, between reviews. Previously the NDIA has not included the additional percentage changes in plan budgets that occur within a plan and before the scheduled review, when reporting this metric, and this has underestimated the extent to which plans have increased.

⁴ A minor change in methodology was applied to the exclusion of zero dollar plans in the inflation calculation. This change has resulted in small one-off changes in some of the historical inflation rates.

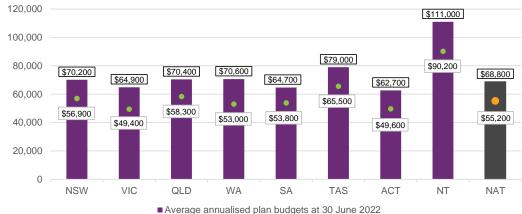
⁵ Socioeconomic status uses deciles from the ABS Index of Education and Occupation (IEO). A higher decile indicates that people residing in that area have a higher level of skills and qualifications on average. The socioeconomic equity metric is equal to the average annualised plan budget of participants residing in the top two IEO deciles divided by the average annualised plan budget of participants residing in the bottom two IEO deciles (participants not in SIL and aged 0 to 64).

- NSW has the highest number (161,055) of active participants.
- The average annualised plan budget at the end of June for active participants is \$68,800 (\$53,500 for participants not in SIL and \$358,000 for participants in SIL).
- The average payment for the 12 months ending 30 June 2022 is \$55,200 (\$39,500 for participants not in SIL and \$340,900 for participants in SIL).
- NT has the highest average annualised plan budgets and payments. This is partially driven by a higher proportion of participants in SIL compared to other States/Territories.

¹ There are 4 active participants at 30 June 2022 with missing State/Territory information. These participants are not shown in the chart above.
