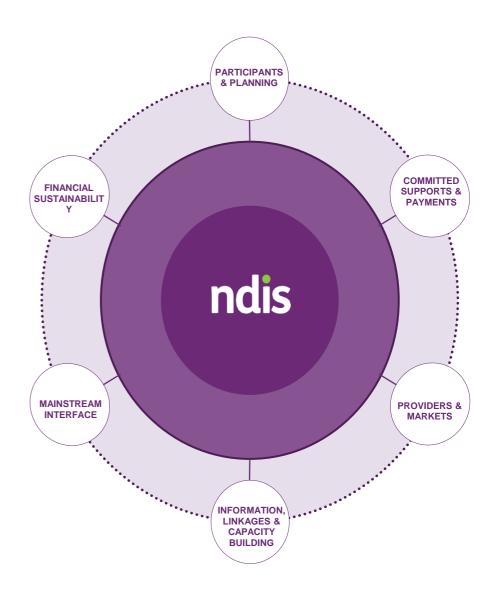




Overview

This report is a summary of the performance and operations of the NDIA in Queensland for Quarter 1 of 2019-20 (01 July 2019 - 30 September 2019).

It is the thirteenth quarterly report during the NDIS Transition period, which commenced on 1 July 2016.





Summary

Participants and Planning

An additional 5,247 active participants received plans this quarter (excluding ECEI).

At 30 September 2019, plans approved and ECEI referrals represent 61% of scheme to date bilateral estimate.

Participant satisfaction remained high in the quarter, with 85% of participants surveyed rating their satisfaction with the Agency's planning process as either 'Good' or 'Very Good'.

Committed Supports and Payments

The following amounts have been paid to providers and participants each financial year:

- \$0.4m in 2013-14,
- \$1.4m in 2014-15,
- \$3.6m in 2015-16,
- \$119.0m in 2016-17,
- \$518.0m in 2017-18,
- \$1,561.0m in 2018-19,
- \$604.8m in 2019-20 to date.

Overall,

- 50% of committed supports were utilised in 2013-14
- 54% in 2014-15
- 53% in 2015-16,
- 56% in 2016-17,
- 63% in 2017-18,
- 63% in 2018-19.

The 2018-19 and 2019-20 experience is still emerging.

Utilisation has increased in each of the first three support years and is likely to increase further for 2018-19. This is to be expected given that more participants are now on a second or subsequent plan, as it takes time to familiarise with the NDIS and decide which supports to use.

Providers and Markets

There were 4,197 active providers as at 30 September 2019, representing a 12% increase for the quarter.

34% of active providers are individuals/sole traders.

25% of active providers are receiving 80-95% of payments made by the NDIA.

Note: The new NDIS Quality and Safeguards Commission (NQSC) commenced to regulate quality and safeguarding of NDIS supports and services. The NQSC has been active in all States and Territories across Australia from 1 July 2019, with the exception of WA which will commence from 1 July 2020.

Mainstream Interface

93% of active participants with a plan approved in 2019-20 Q1 access mainstream services.

Note: Jurisdiction is defined by the current residing address of the participant. This is a change from the previous quarter, where the jurisdiction was based on where the participant resided when they had their initial plan approved. This change may affect comparability to the prior quarter.

Participants and Planning

The NDIS in Queensland continues to grow with 5,247 additional active participants with approved plans this quarter.

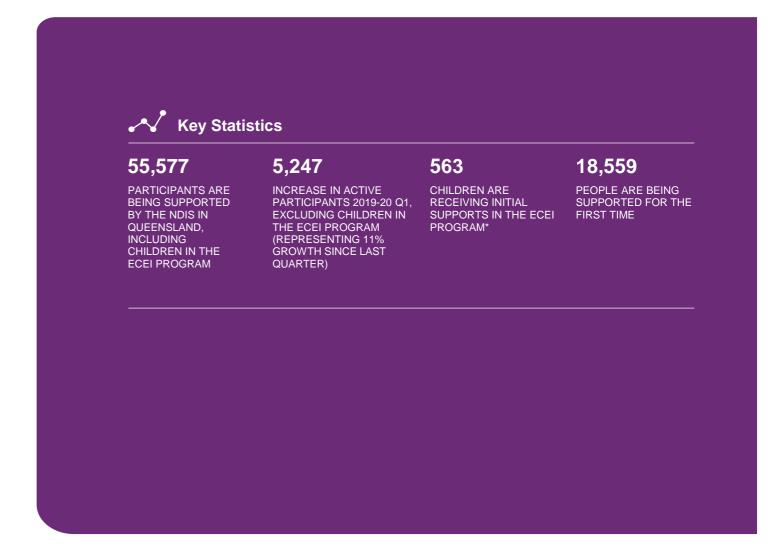
In total, over 55,000 participants are being supported by the NDIS in Queensland, with 33% receiving support for the first time.





Summary

The NDIS has been transitioning to fullscheme according to phasing schedules bilaterally agreed by State/Territory and Commonwealth governments.

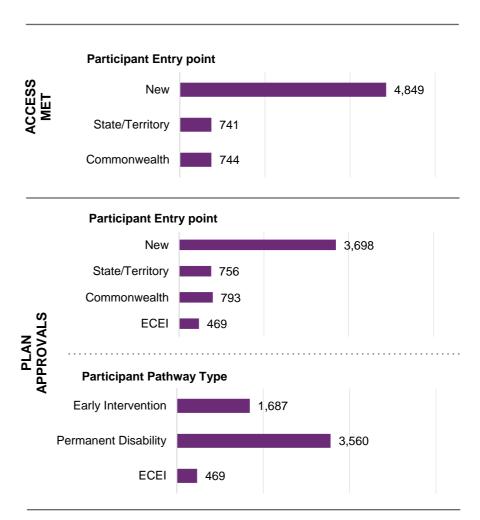
2019-20 Q1

Of the 6,334 participants active and deemed 'eligible' this quarter 77% were 'New' participants (i.e. had not transitioned from an existing State/Territory or Commonwealth program).

Of the 5,247 new active participants this quarter, 70% were 'New' participants (i.e. had not transitioned from an existing State/Territory or Commonwealth program), 68% entered with a permanent disability.

Note: The definition used to report on children being supported in the ECEI gateway has changed compared with the last quarter due to improvements in data collection. This is the result of the introduction of new ICT capability. While the total number of children being supported in the ECEI gateway is accurate, the information on the timing of supports provided will improve going forward. Therefore, the results based on those who commenced receiving supports in the quarter should be treated with caution.







Quarterly Intake Detail

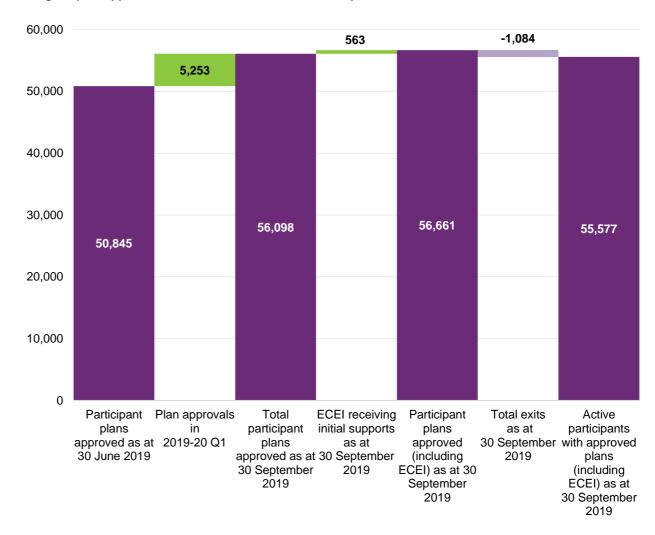
Plan approval numbers have increased from 50,845 at the end of 2018-19 Q4 to 56,098 by the end of 2019-20 Q1, an increase of 5,253 approvals.

At the end of the quarter, 563 children are receiving initial supports in the ECEI gateway.

Overall, 1,084 participants with approved plans have exited the Scheme, resulting in 55,577 active participants (including ECEI) as at 30 September 2019.

There were 12,367 plan reviews this quarter. This figure relates to all participants who have entered the scheme.

Change in plan approvals between 30 June 2019 and 30 September 2019





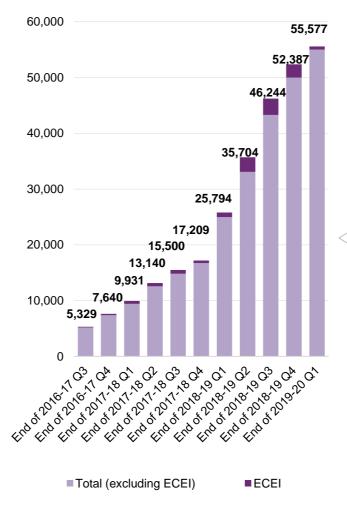
Cumulative Position

At the end of 2019-20 Q1, the cumulative total number of active participants that are receiving support is 55,577 (including 563 children receiving initial supports in the ECEI gateway). Of these, 30,369 transitioned from an existing State/Territory program, 6,086 transitioned from an existing Commonwealth program and 18,559 participants have received support for the first time.

Overall, since 1 July 2013, there have been 75,452 people with access decisions.

Cumulative position reporting is inclusive of trial participants for the reported period and represents participants who were active at the end of each period.

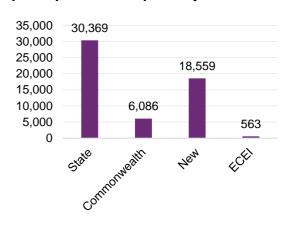

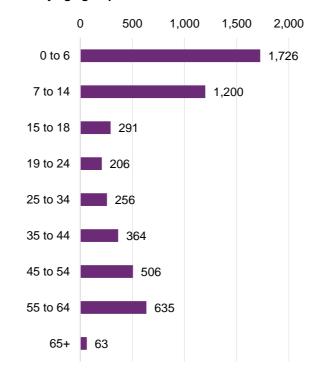
Participant Profiles by Age Group

These bar charts show the demographic profile of active participants with a plan approved in 2019-20 Q1, compared with plan approvals as at 30 June 2019, by age group.

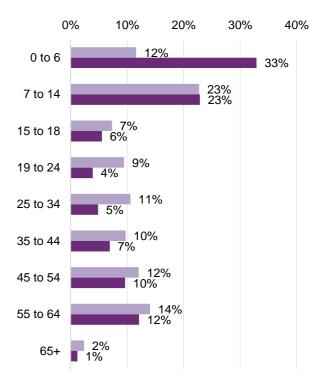
33% of participants entering in this quarter are aged 0 to 6 years. This compares with 12% in prior quarters.

This is driven by a relatively high proportion of 'new' participants entering this quarter compared to prior quarters.

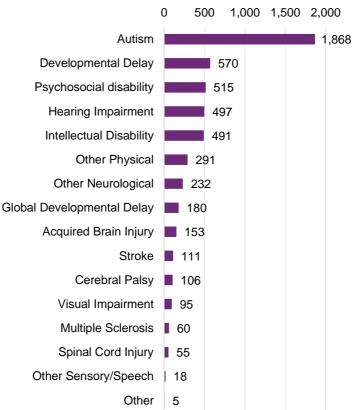


Participant Profiles by Disability Group

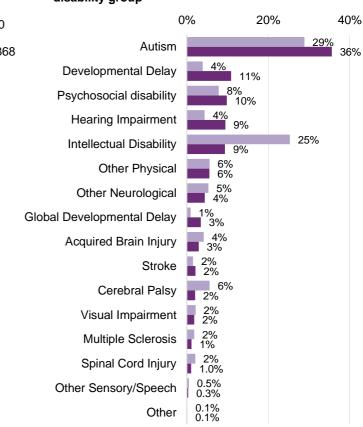
These bar charts show the demographic profile of active participants with a plan approved in 2019-20 Q1, compared with plan approvals as at 30 June 2019, by disability group.

36% of participants entering this quarter have a primary disability group of Autism, compared to 29% in previous quarters. Furthermore, 11% of participants entering this quarter have a primary disability group of Developmental Delay, compared to 4% in previous quarters. The increase was mainly driven by the large proportion of participants aged 0 to 6 entering in this quarter.

Participant Profiles by Level of Function

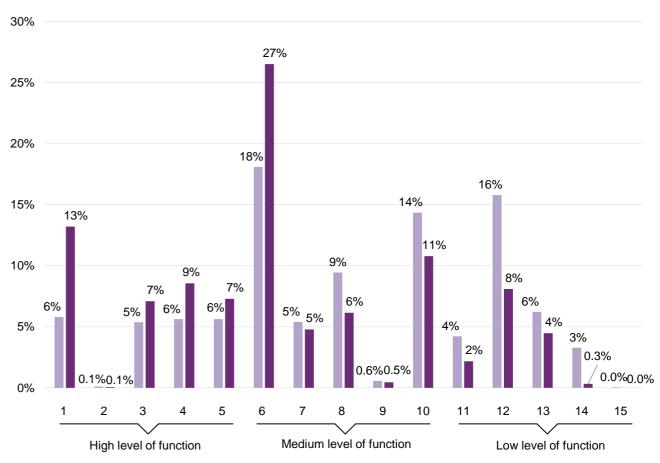
These bar charts show the demographic profile of active participants with a plan approved in 2019-20 Q1, compared with plan approvals as at 30 June 2019, by level of function.

For participants with a plan approval in this quarter:

- 36% of active participants had a relatively high level of function
- 49% of active participants had a relatively moderate level of function
- 15% had a relatively low level of function

These relativities are within the NDIS participant population, and not comparable to the general population.

■% of active participants with a plan approved in prior quarters

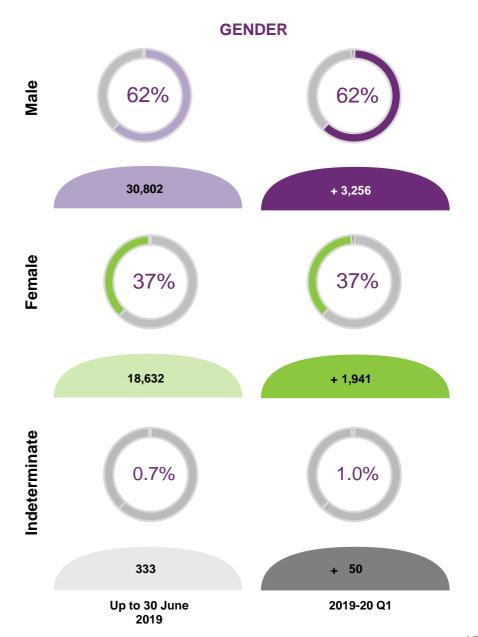
■% of active participants with a plan approved in 2019-20 Q1



Participant Profiles by Gender

These charts show the demographic profile of active participants with a plan approved in 2019-20 Q1, compared with plan approvals as at 30 June 2019, by gender.

The majority of participants are males. Consistent with population data, this is driven by autism and developmental delay where prevalence rates are higher for males compared with females.





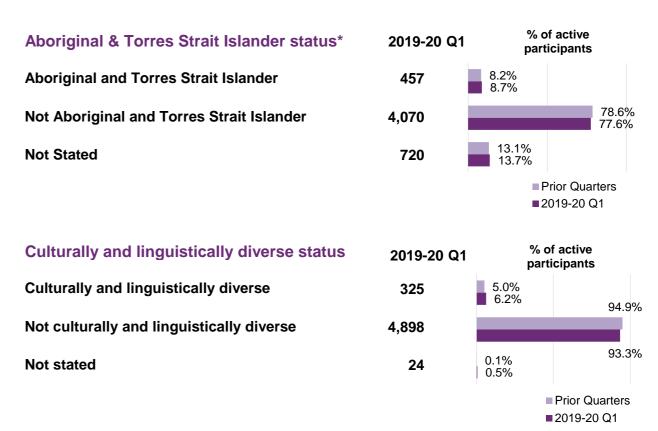
Participant Profiles

These bar charts show other demographic profiles of active participants with a plan approved in 2019-20 Q1, compared with plan approvals as at 30 June 2019.

Of the participants with a plan approved in 2019-20 Q1:

- 8.7% were Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander, compared with 8.2% in previous periods combined.
- 6.2% were culturally and linguistically diverse, compared with 5.0% in previous periods combined.
- •There were 1,012 participants in residential aged care. 799 of them were under the age of 65 years.

*Note: The proportion of participants with a 'Not Stated' response regarding Indigenous status has increased compared with previous periods, with an offsetting reduction to the proportion of participants with a 'No' response. This is the result of a correction to the data and has no impact on the proportion of Indigenous participants identified.



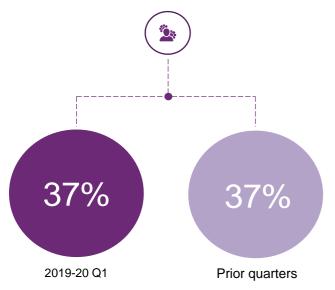


Plan Management Support Coordination

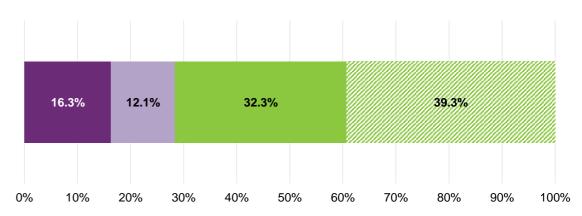
The proportion of participants electing to fully or partly self-manage their plan was higher in 2019-20 Q1 at 31%, compared with 28% in previous quarters combined.

37% of participants who have had a plan approved in 2019-20 Q1 have support coordination in their plan, in line with previous quarters combined.

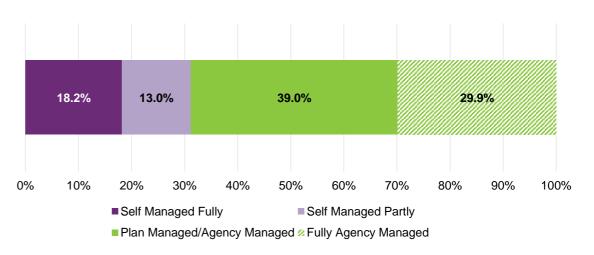
Support Coordination

Plan Activation

Plan activation refers to the amount of time between a participant's initial plan being approved, and the date the participant first receives support. In-kind supports are included.

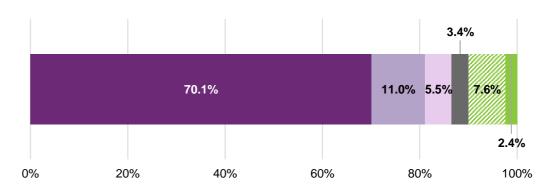
The percentage of participants who activated plans within 90 days of initial plan approval was:

- 90% of participants entering in 2018-19 Q3
- 87% of participants entering in previous quarters combined

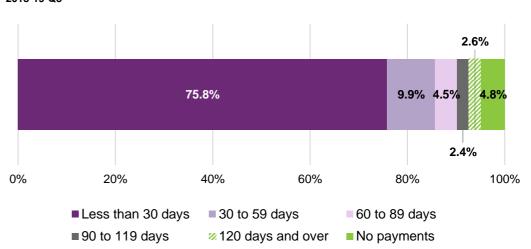
Plan activation figures are approximations based on payment data. As there is a lag between when the support is provided to a participant, and the payment being made, these statistics are a conservative estimate; it is likely plan activation is faster than presented.

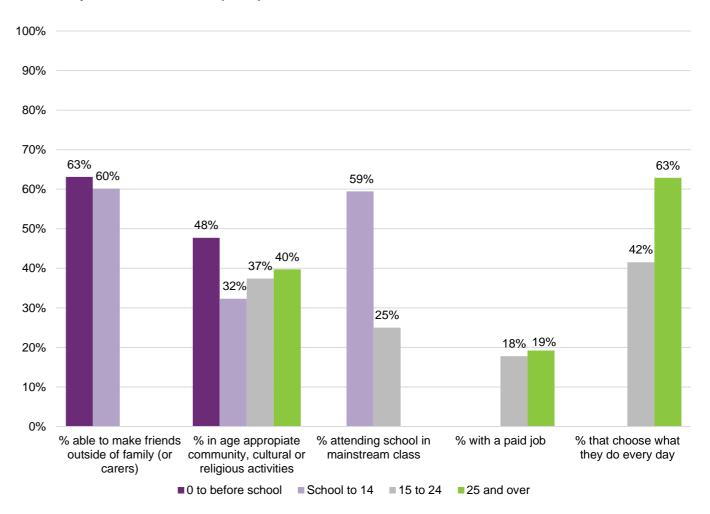


Participant Outcomes

This information on participant outcomes has been collected from 99% of participants who received their initial plan since 1 July 2016 (when they entered the scheme).

- 63% of participants aged 0 to before school are able to make friends outside of family/carers, compared to 60% of participants from school age to 14
- 48% of participants aged 0 to before school are engaged in age appropriate community, cultural or religious activities, compared to 32% to 40% for other age groups
- 59% of participants from school age to 14 attend school in a mainstream class, compared to 25% of participants aged 15 to 24
- 19% of participants aged 25 and over have a paid job, compared to 18% of participants aged 15 to 24
- 63% of participants aged 25 and over choose what they do every day, compared to 42% of participants aged 15 to 24

Selected key baseline indicators for participants



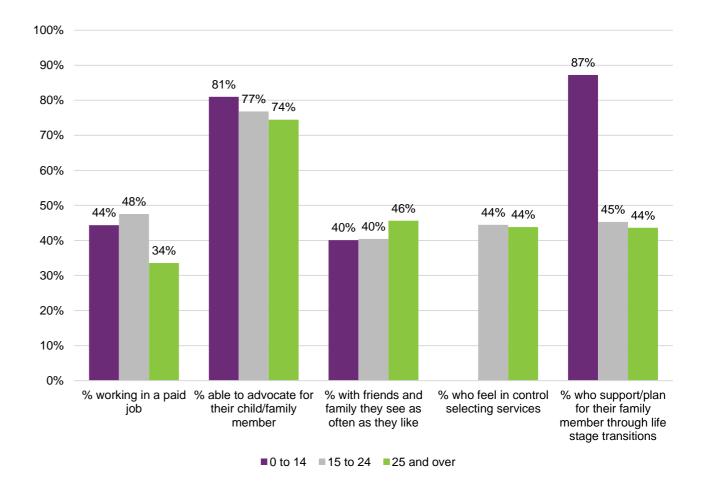


Family/Carers Outcomes

The percentage of participants' families/carers when they entered the Scheme (baseline indicators):

- working in a paid job was highest for participants aged 15 to 24 (48%)
- able to advocate for their child/family member was highest for participants aged 0 to 14 (81%)
- who have friends and family they can see as often as they like was highest for participants aged 25 and over (46%)
- who feel in control selecting services was similar for all age groups (44%)
- who support/plan for their family member through life stage transitions was highest for participants aged 0 to 14 (87%)

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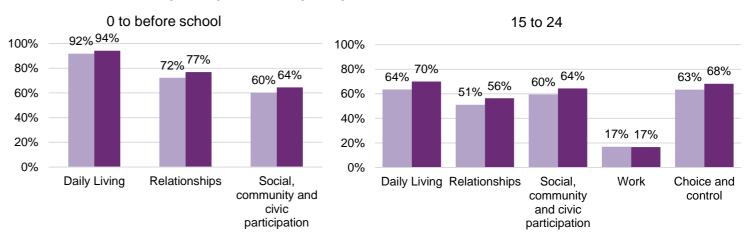

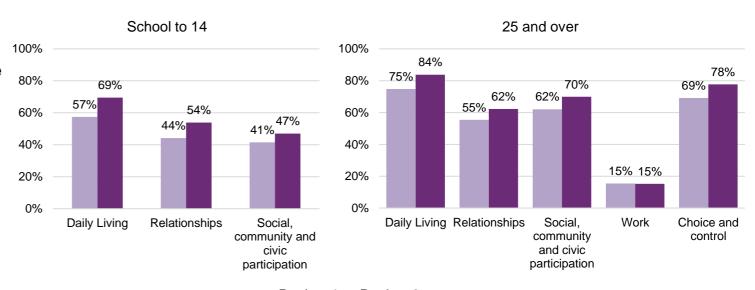

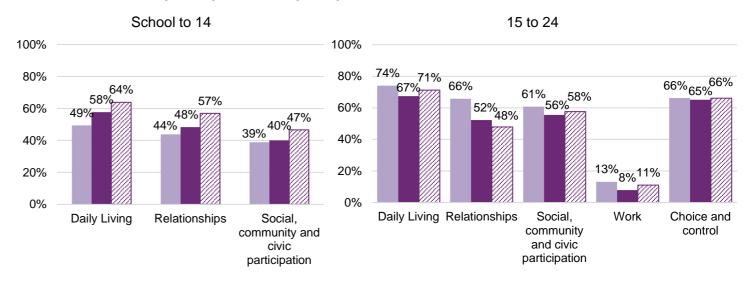

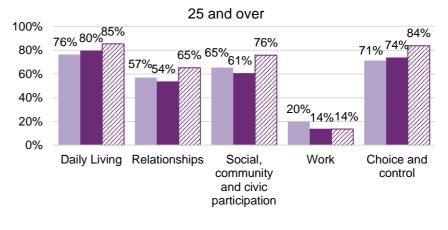

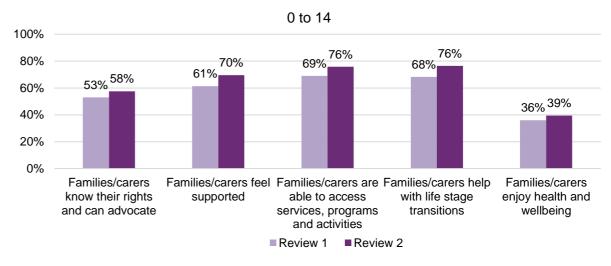

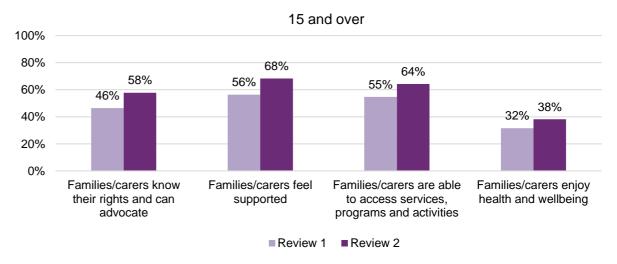

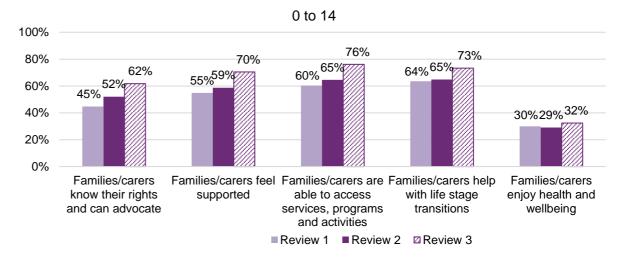

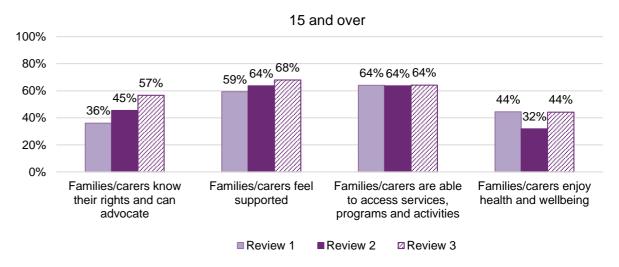

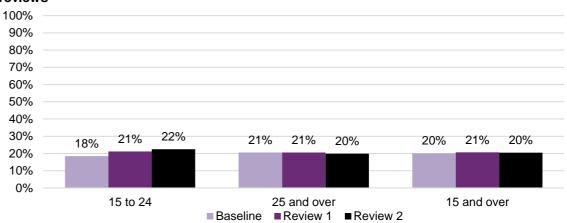
Participants in Work

The NDIA is acutely aware of the benefits that employment brings to participants and tracks employment outcomes to see whether the NDIS has helped participants to find paid work.

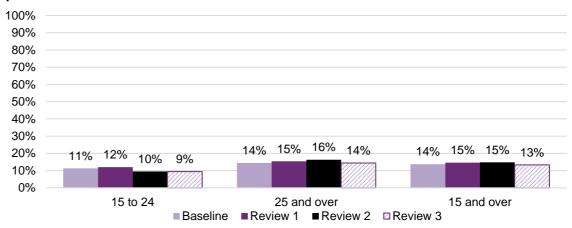
Baseline measures on employment are collected as a participant enters the Scheme and at their subsequent plan reviews. The first chart relates to participants who have entered the Scheme between 1 October 2016 and 30 September 2017, and have had two plan reviews to date. The second chart relates to participants who have entered the Scheme between 1 July 2016 and 30 September 2016, and have had three plan reviews to date.

The overall percentage of participants in paid work remained steady for participants aged 15 and over.

NDIS participants in paid employment, by age group – participants with first, second and third plan reviews





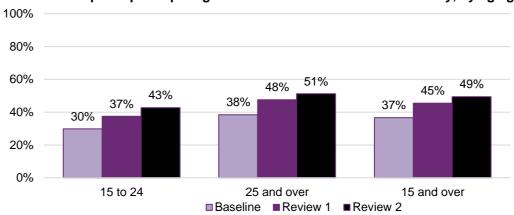
Participants involved in community and social activities

The number of participants engaging in community and social activities is one of the key measures for ensuring quality experiences and outcomes for participants.

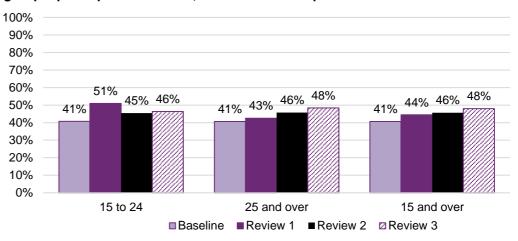
Baseline measures on engaging in community and social activities are collected as a participant enters the Scheme and at their subsequent plan reviews. The first chart relates to participants who have entered the Scheme between 1 October 2016 and 30 September 2017, and have had two plan reviews to date. The second chart relates to participants who have entered the Scheme between 1 July 2016 and 30 September 2016, and have had three plan reviews to date.

Across all age groups, there has been considerable increase in the percentage of participants engaged in community and social activities.





NDIS participants participating in social activities in their community, by age group – participants with first, second and third plan reviews

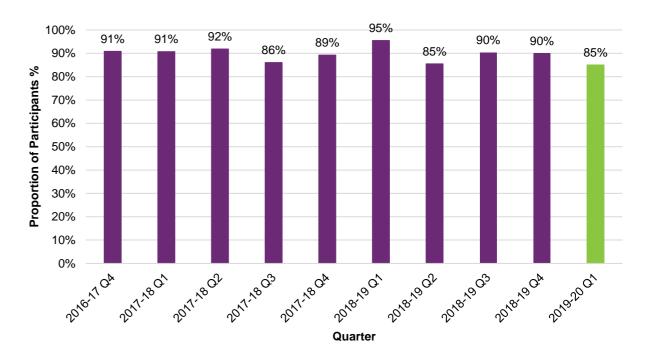




Participant Satisfaction

Proportion of participants describing satisfaction with the Agency's planning process as good or very good - by quarter





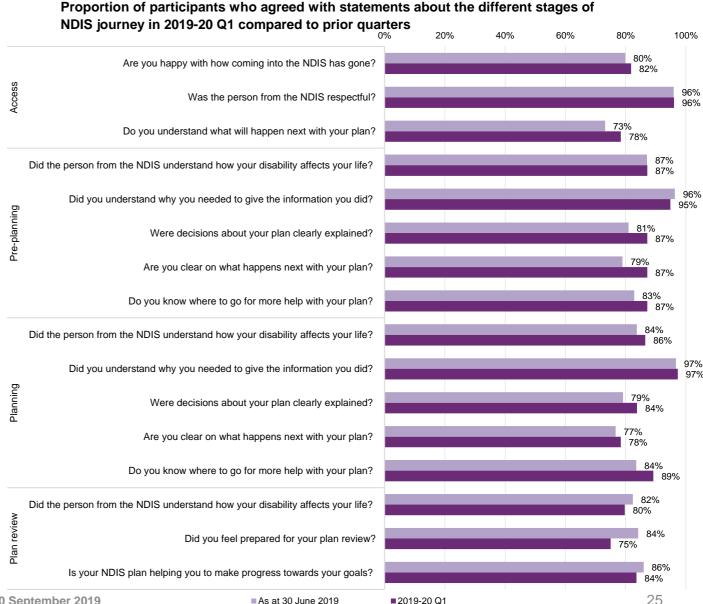
Participant Satisfaction -New Survey Method

A new participant satisfaction survey has been developed to better record the experience of NDIS participants and their families and carers at different stages of the participant pathway.

It began roll-out on 1 September 2018 and will become the primary tool for analysing participant experience. The new survey is designed to gather data at the four primary stages of the participant pathway:

- Access
- Pre-planning
- Planning
- Plan Review

Generally, there have been improvements in participant satisfaction at each stage of the pathway in this quarter, except for the Plan review stage. There is still work required to improve participant understanding of the NDIS process and what happens next for individuals at each stage of the process.





Committed Supports and Payments

Both committed and paid supports to participants are increasing in line with the growing scheme.

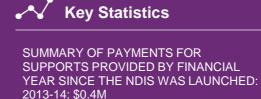
Of the \$4.6 billion that has been committed in participant plans, \$2.8 billion has been paid to date.

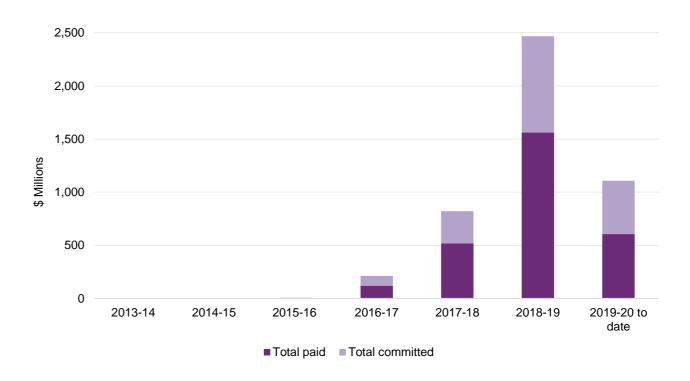

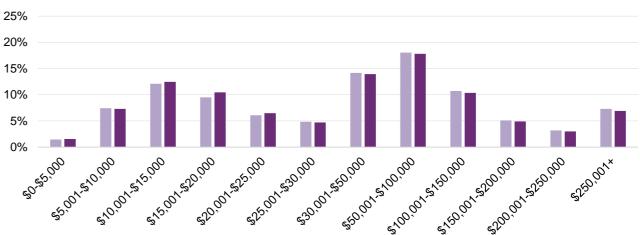




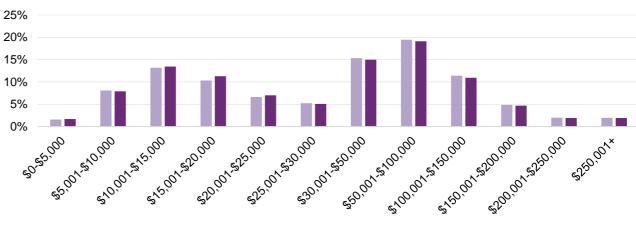
Committed Supports by Cost Band

Distribution of average annualised committed supports by cost band (excluding SIL)



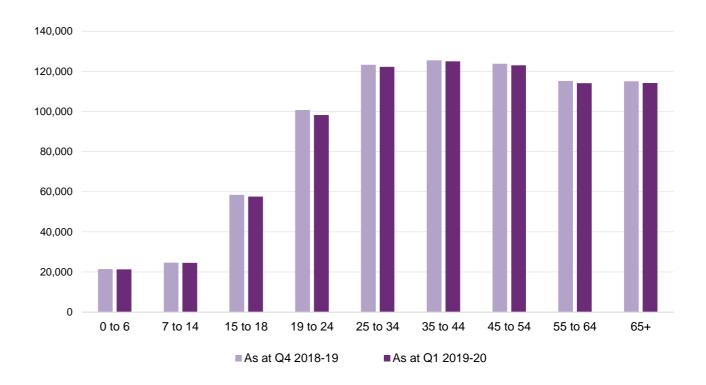

Average annualised committed supports by age band



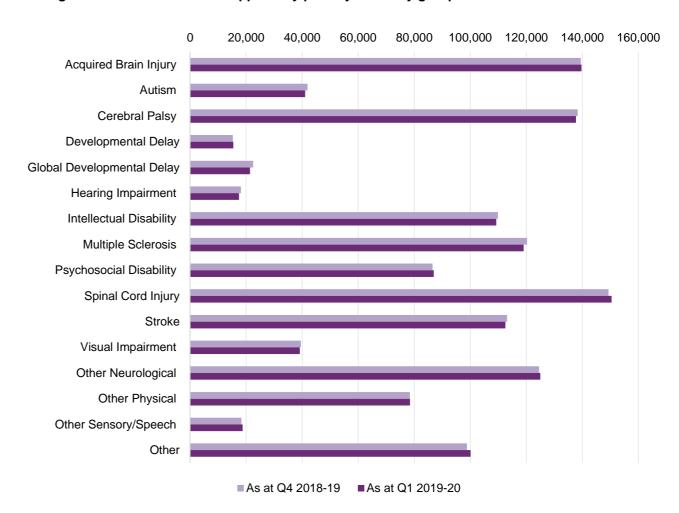

Average annualised committed supports by primary disability group



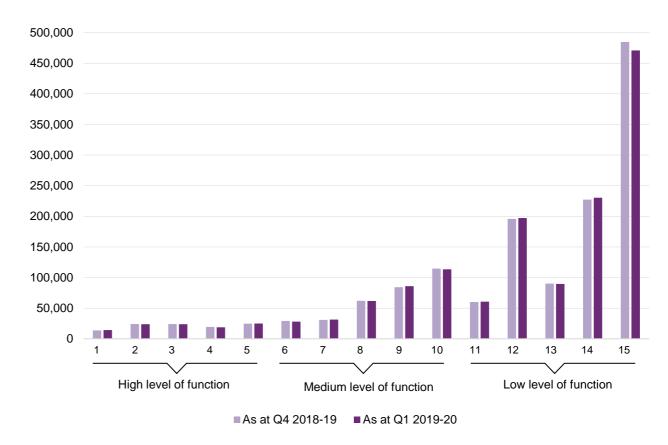


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Committed Supports by Level of Function

Providers and Markets

The provider network grows in scale and diversity, increasing participants' access to high quality services.

There were 4,197 active providers as at 30 September 2019, 439 of which were active for the first time in the quarter.

The new NDIS Quality and Safeguards Commission (NQSC) commenced to regulate quality and safeguarding of NDIS supports and services. The NQSC has been active in all States and Territories across Australia from 1 July 2019, with the exception of WA which will commence from 1 July 2020.







This section contains information on active service providers and the market, with key provider and market indicators presented.

Provider registration

- From 1 July 2019, providers in all States and Territories across Australia (except WA) register with the NQSC by submitting a registration request, indicating the types of support they are accredited to provide. The NQSC will commence operating in WA from 1 July 2020.
- The NQSC uses a 'National approach' to approve providers and thus, any provider which has been verified in any other States or Territories (with the exception of WA) is automatically approved in Queensland.

How providers interact with participants

- NDIS participants have the flexibility to choose the providers who support them.
- Providers are paid for disability supports and services provided to the participants.

As at 30 September 2019, there were 4,197 active service providers, of which 1,437 were individual/sole trader operated businesses and 2,760 were companies or organisations.

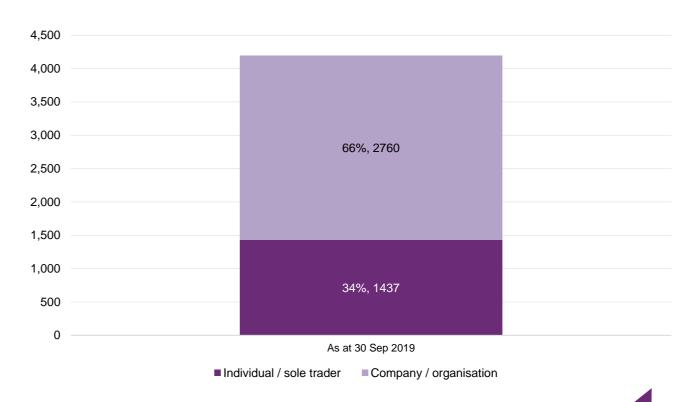

The number of active service providers increased by 12% to 4,197 in the quarter. Currently 34% of active service providers are individuals/sole traders.

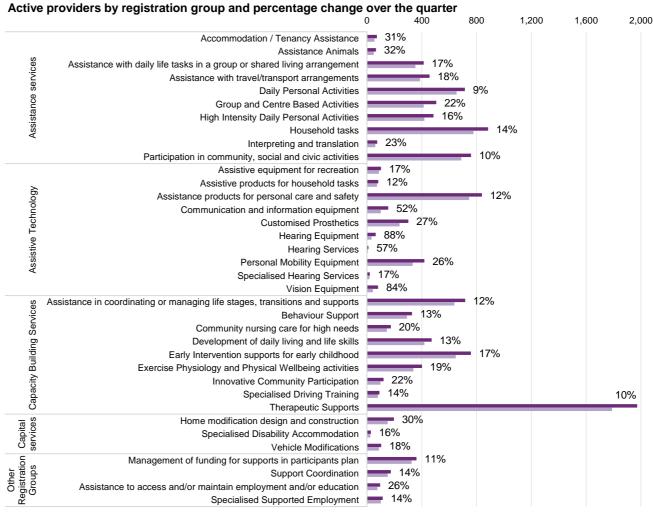


Active Registration groups

The registration groups with the largest numbers of active providers continue to grow:

- Therapeutic Supports: from 1,789 to 1,973 (10% increase)
- Household tasks: from 778 to 884 (14% increase)
- Assistance products for personal care and safety: from 746 to 839 (12% increase)
- Participation in community, social and civic activities: from 688 to 760 (10% increase)
- Early Intervention supports for early childhood: from 648 to 759 (17% increase)

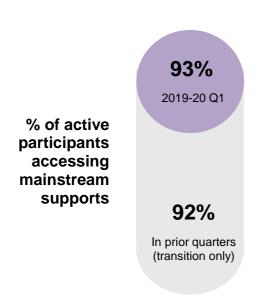

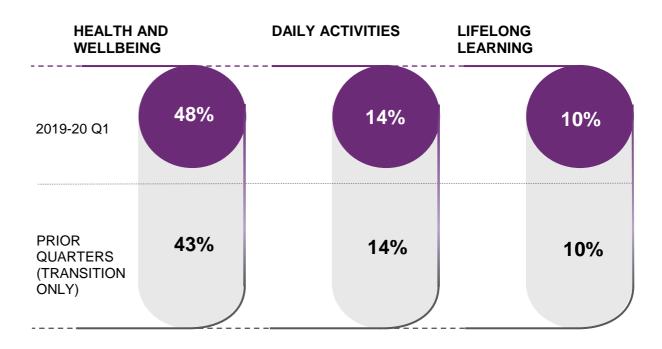




Mainstream Interface
