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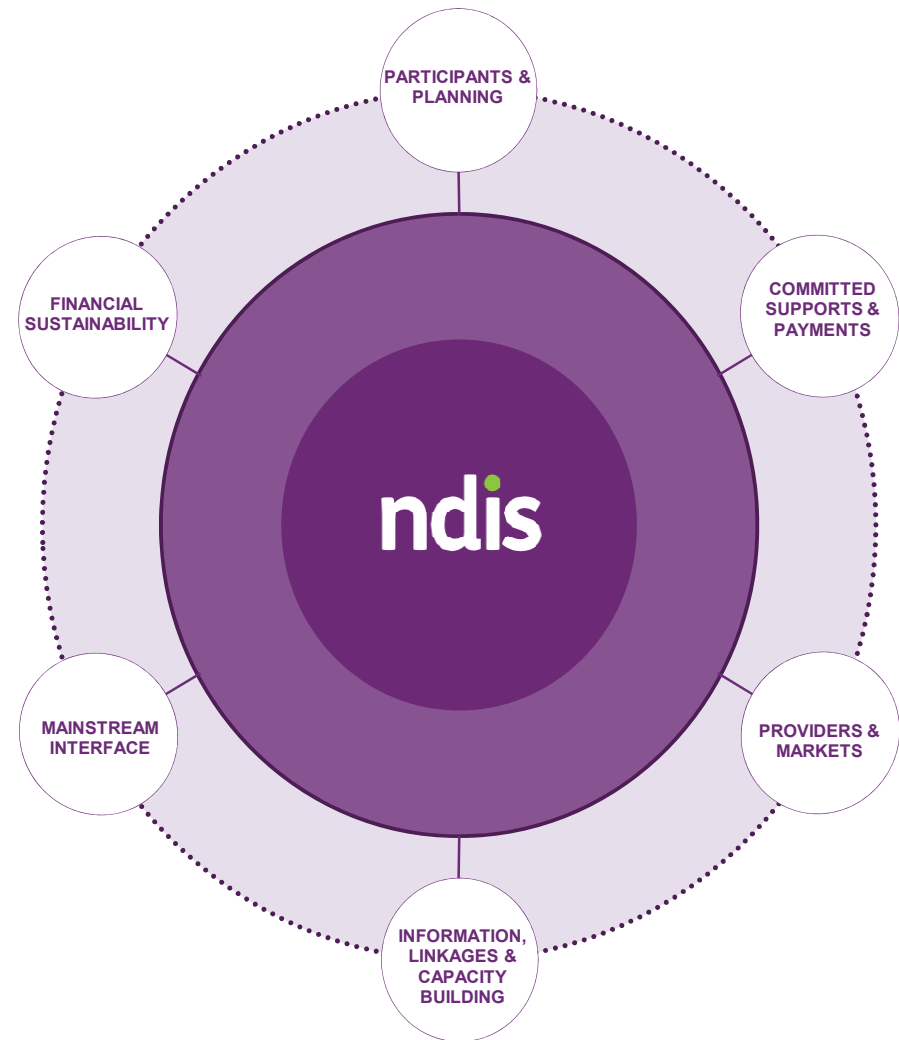
Disability Reform Council Quarterly Performance Report

Queensland - 30 September 2017



Overview

This report is the fifth quarterly report during the NDIS Transition period, which commenced on 1 July 2016.



Summary

Participants and Planning

As at 30 September 2017, there were 9,733 participants with approved plans (including children in the ECEI gateway).

As at 30 September 2017, plans approved and ECEI referrals represent:

- 67% of year to date bilateral estimate met (1 July 2017 - 30 September 2017)
- 52% of transition to date bilateral estimate met (1 July 2016 - 30 September 2017)
- 53% of scheme to date bilateral estimate met (1 April 2016 - 30 September 2017)

The satisfaction rating remained high with 91% of participants surveyed in the quarter rating their satisfaction with the Agency's planning process either good or very good.

Committed Supports and Payments

\$663.4 million of supports has been committed to 9,237 participants. This includes \$197.8 million of supports in respect of prior financial years, \$442.5 million of supports in respect of 2017-18[^] and \$23.1 million of supports in respect of later years*.

\$169.6 million has been paid to providers and participants.

Overall, 32% of committed supports were utilised in 2015-16. Currently utilisation is 54% in 2016-17, although this will likely increase as there is a lag between when support is provided and when it is paid.

Providers and Markets

1,875 approved providers, a 26% increase during the quarter.

80-90% of payments made by the NDIA are received by 25% of providers.

30% of services providers are individual/sole traders.

Mainstream Interface

90% of active participants with a plan approved in 2017-18 Q1 access mainstream services.

The proportion of participants entering in the current quarter accessing mainstream services is higher compared to prior quarters.

Participants and Planning

As the transition phase to full scheme continues, the NDIS in Queensland continues to grow with 2,049 additional participants with approved plans this quarter.

496 children were in the ECEI gateway at 30 September 2017. Of these, 141 were previously confirmed as ECEI at 30 June 2017 and an additional 355 entered the gateway this quarter.

Participants and Planning

The NDIS is transitioning to full-scheme in line with phasing schedules bilaterally agreed by State/Territory and Commonwealth governments.

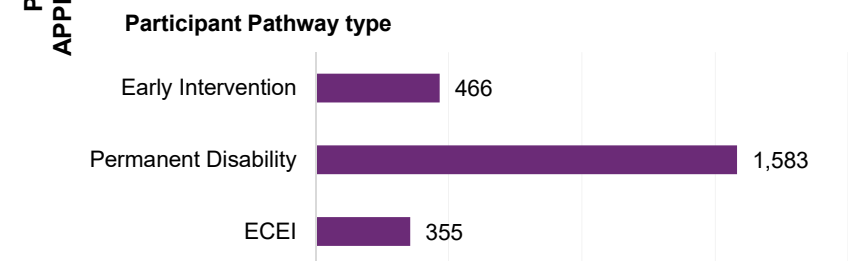
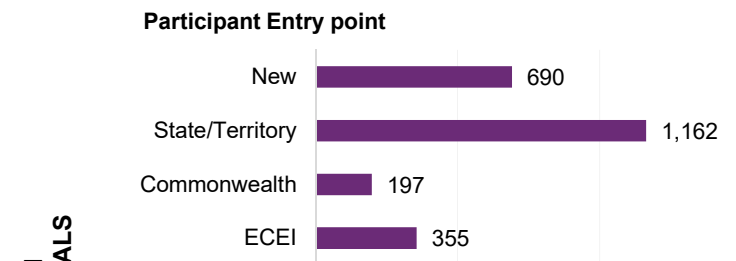
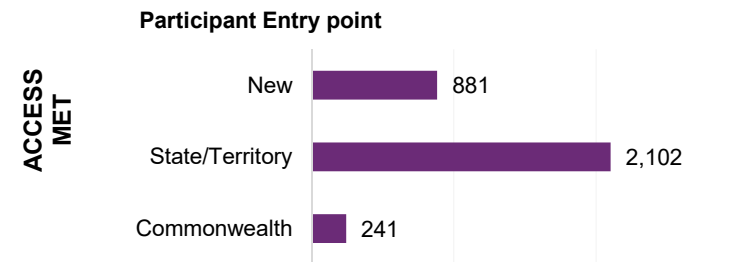
Quarterly Intake

2017-18 Q1

Of the 3,224 participants deemed 'eligible' this quarter 65% entered from an existing State/Territory program.

Of the 2,049 plan approvals this quarter, 57% had transitioned from an existing State/Territory program and 77% entered with a permanent disability.

Overall, since 1 April 2016, there have been 14,121 people with access decisions, and 9,733 participants with an approved plan (including children in the ECEI gateway).



Note: Of the 2,049 initial plans approved this quarter, 71 were previously confirmed as ECEI at 30 June 2017.

Quarterly Intake Detail

Plan approvals as at 30 September 2017

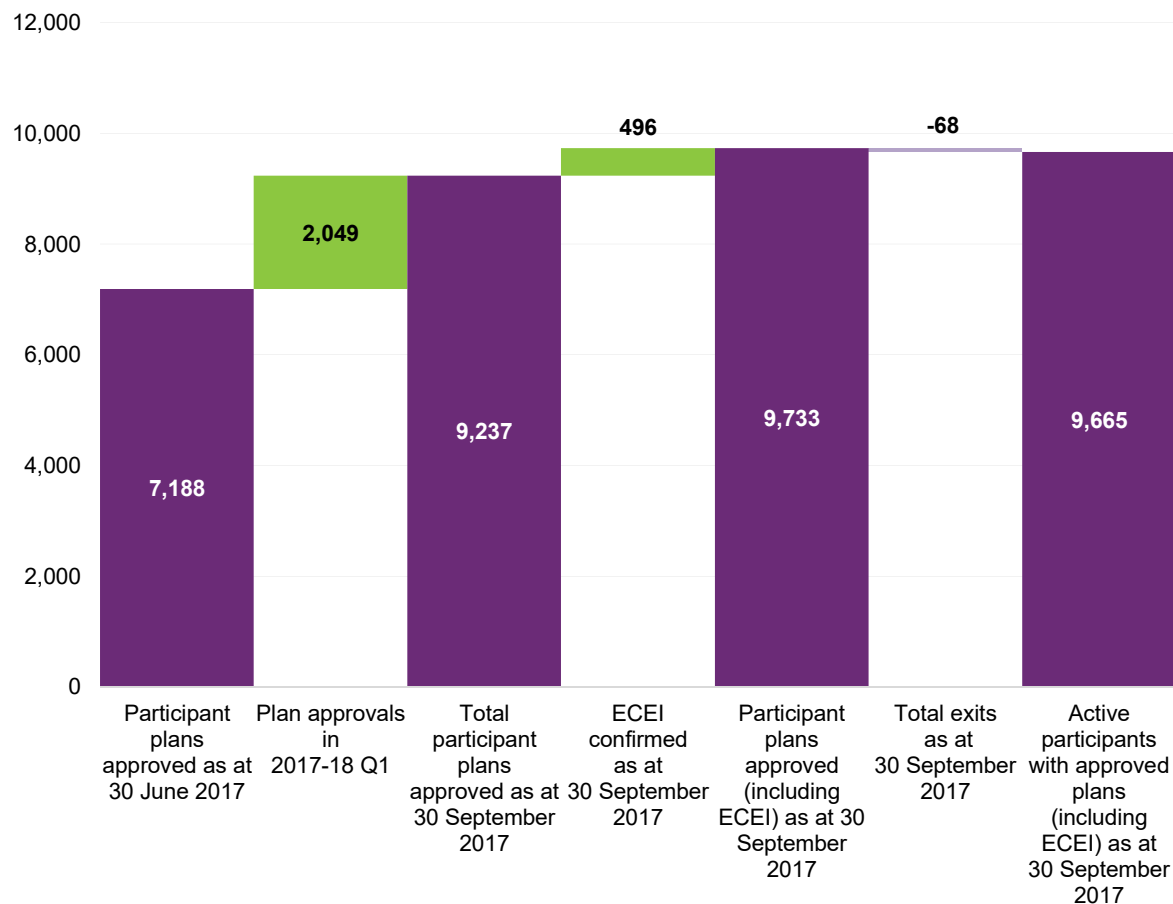
Plan approval numbers have increased from 7,188 at the end of 2016-17 Q4 to 9,237 by the end of 2017-18 Q1, an increase of 2,049 approvals.

As at 30 September 2017 there were 496 children with a confirmed ECEI referral bringing the total number to 9,733. Overall, 68 participants with approved plans have exited the Scheme.

Of the 496 children with a confirmed ECEI referral as at 30 September 2017, 141 were previously confirmed as ECEI at 30 June 2017 and an additional 355 entered the gateway this quarter.

In the quarter of 2017-18 Q1 there were 1,234 plan reviews. This figure relates to all participants who have entered the scheme (including transition).

Plan approvals as at 30 September 2017

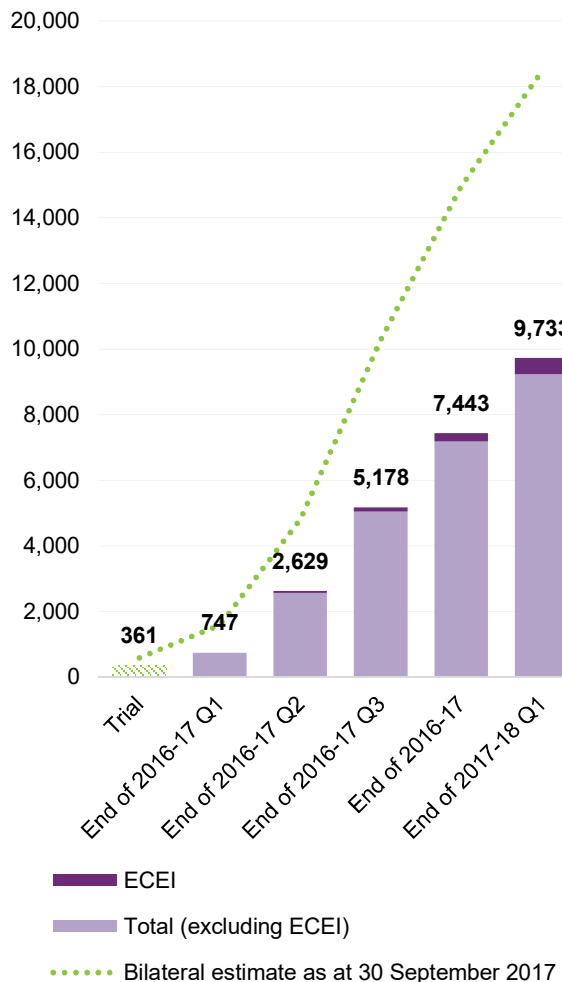
As at the end of 2017-18 Q1, the cumulative total number of participants receiving support was 9,733 (including 496 children supported through the ECEI gateway). Of these, 6,308 transitioned from an existing State/Territory program and 653 transitioned from an existing Commonwealth program.

In addition, 2,693 participants were awaiting a plan as at 30 September 2017.

It should be noted that, based on an agreement between Ministers, an estimated 500 existing Queensland participants expected to transition during 2017-18 Q1 were prioritised for transition during 2016-17 Q4.

Cumulative position reporting is inclusive of trial participants for the reported period and represents participants who have or have had an approved plan.

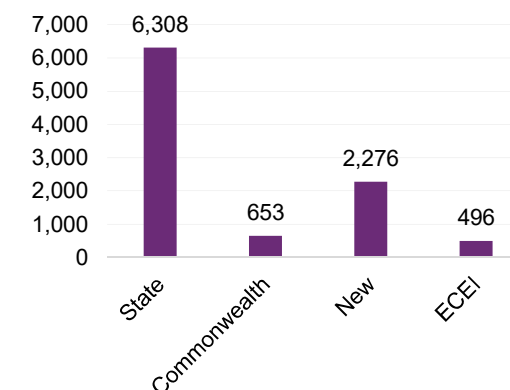

Plan approvals by participant referral pathway



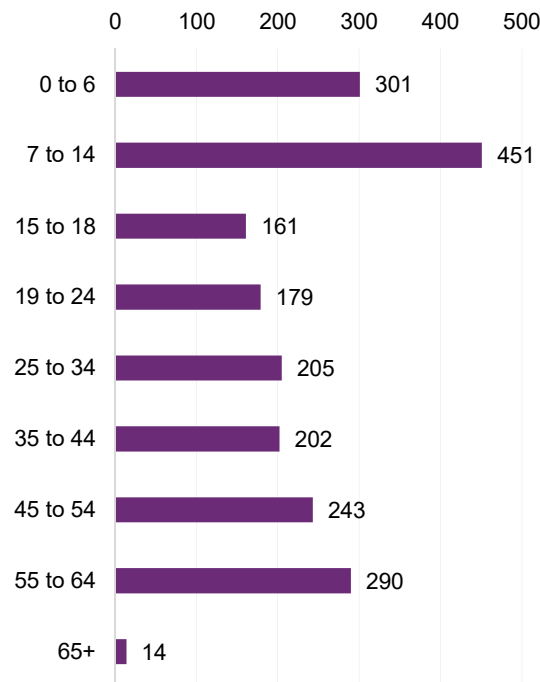

Demographic profile of active participants with a plan approved in the quarter of 2017-18 Q1, compared with plan approvals as at 30 June 2017.

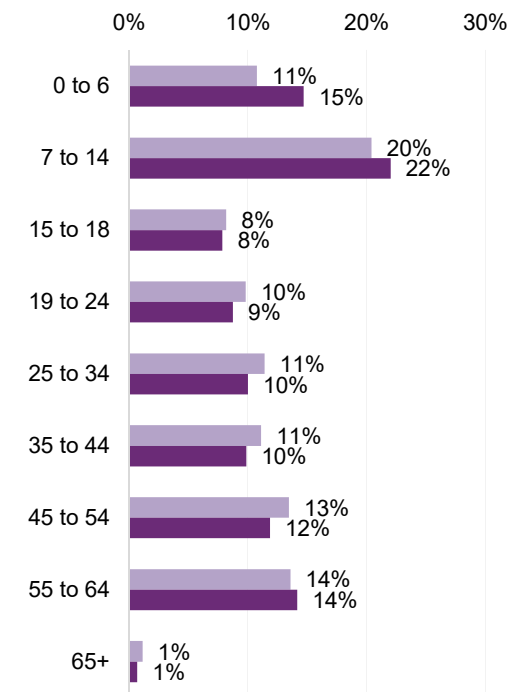
Around 15% of participants entering in this quarter are aged 0 to 6 years, and 22% of participants are aged 7 to 14 years. These are higher compared to prior quarters.

The proportions of participants entering in this quarter aged 15 to 54 years is slightly lower compared to prior quarters.

■ % of active participants with a plan approved in prior quarters

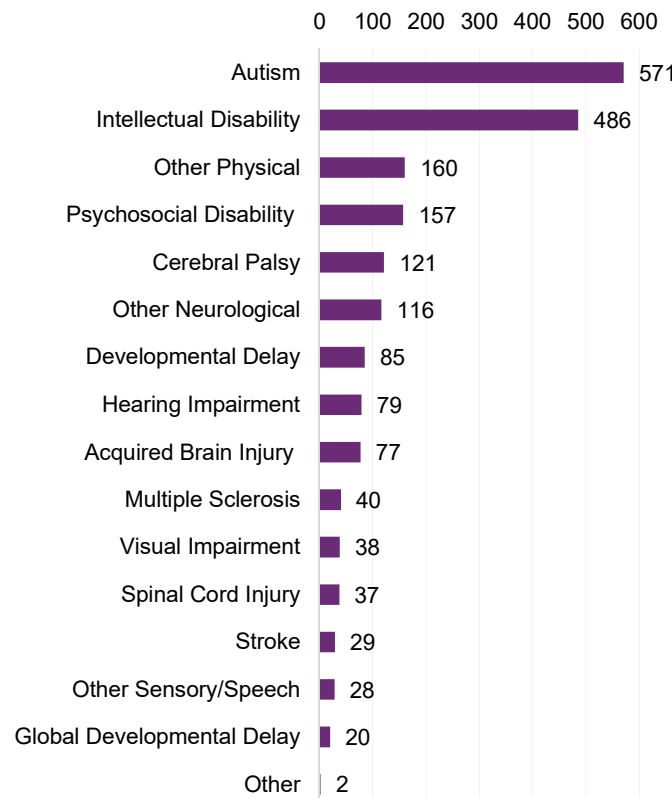

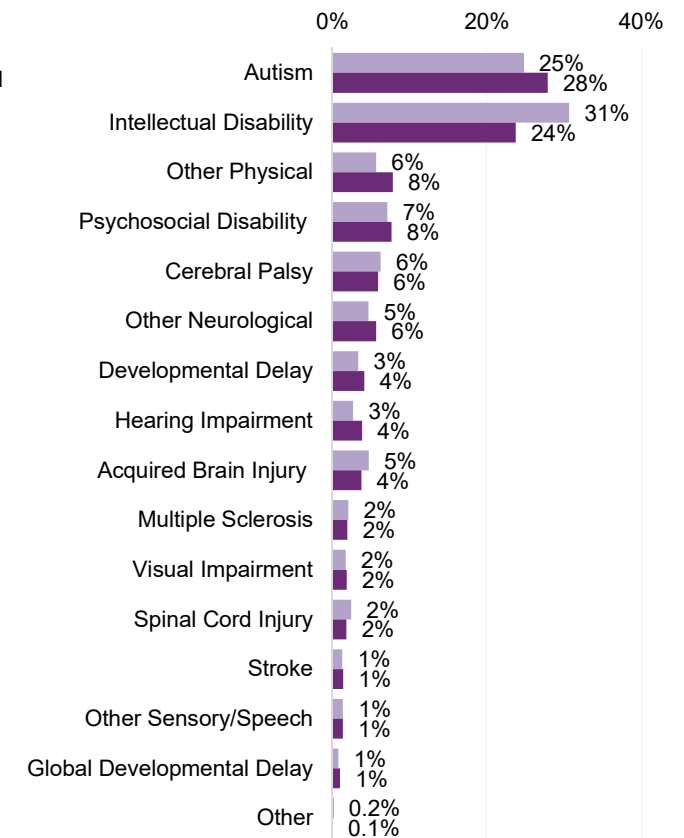

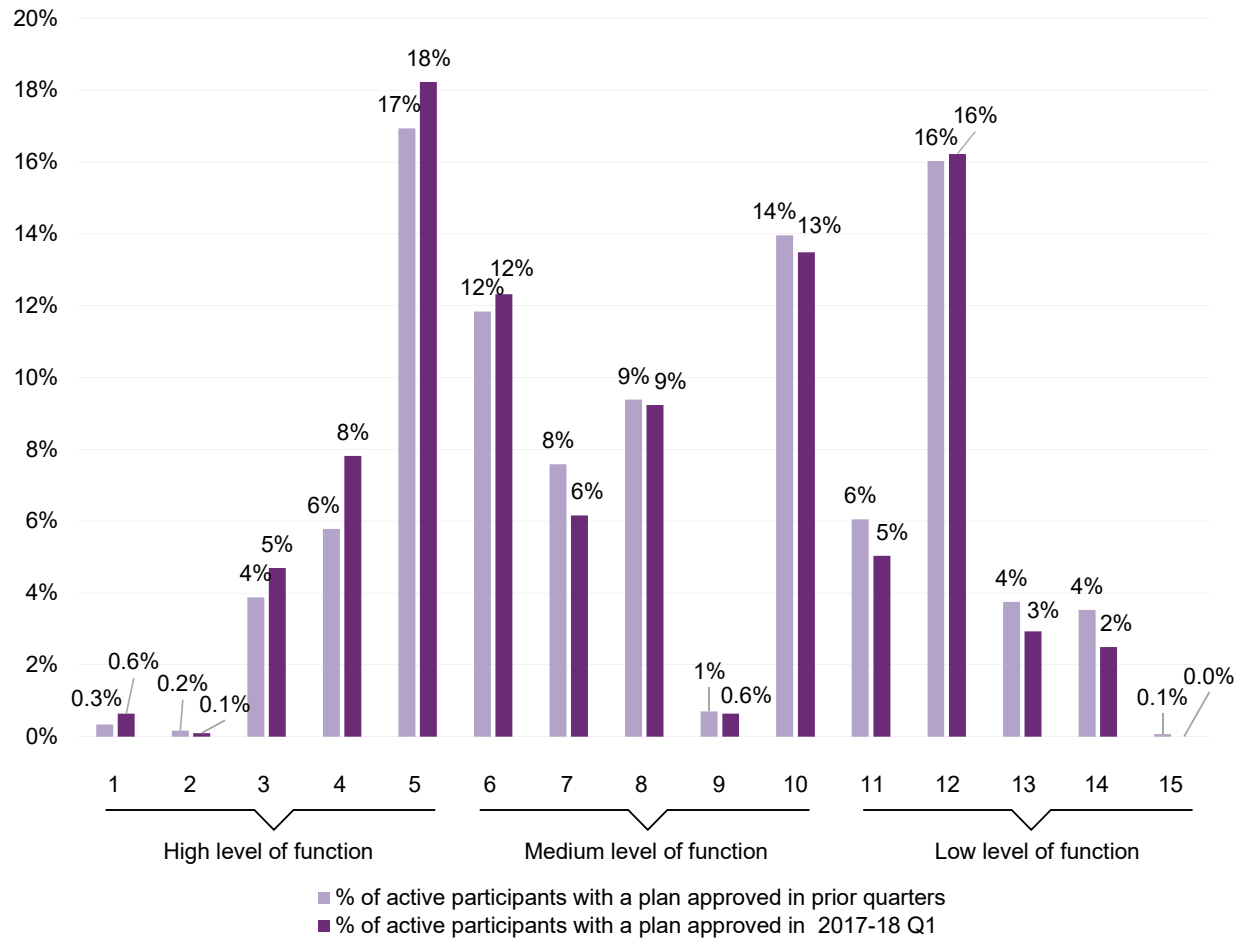
Demographic profile of active participants with a plan approved in the quarter of 2017-18 Q1, compared with plan approvals as at 30 June 2017.

For participants with a plan approval in the current period:

- 31% of active participants had a relatively high level of function
- 42% of active participants had a relatively moderate level of function
- 27% had a relatively low level of function

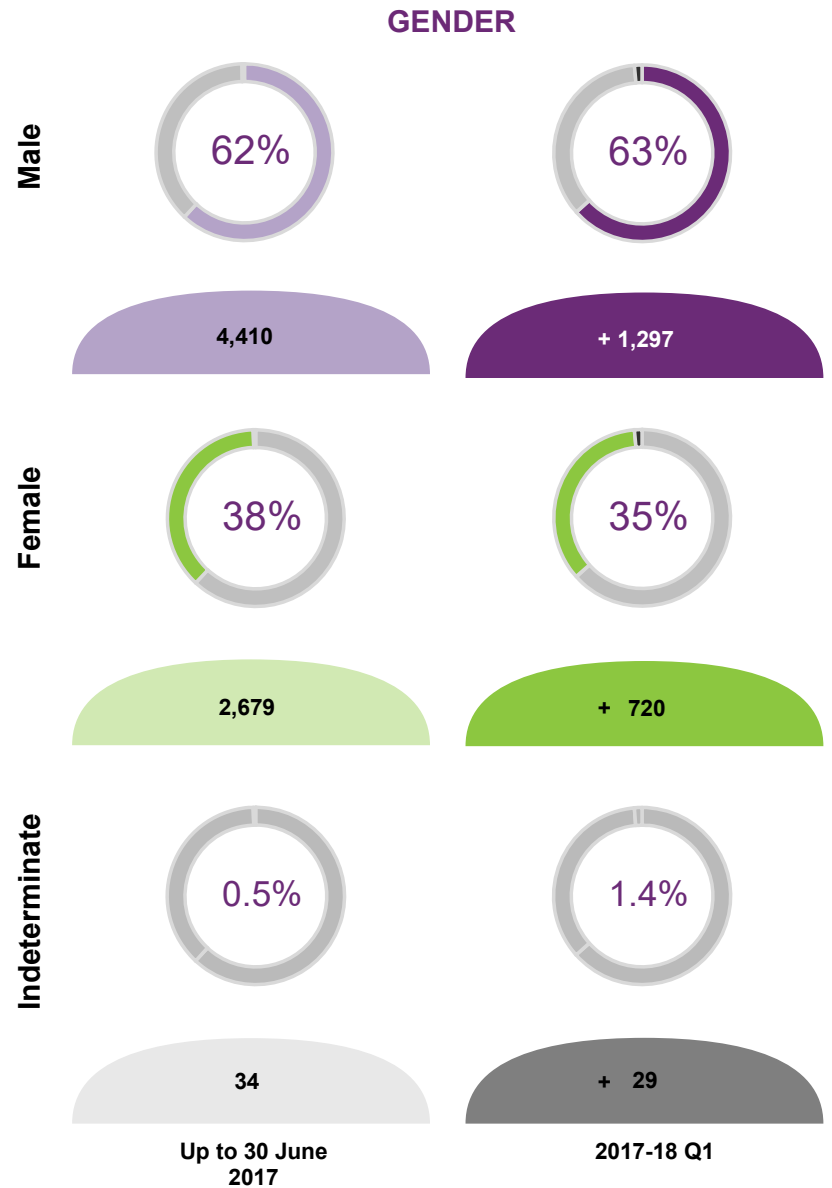
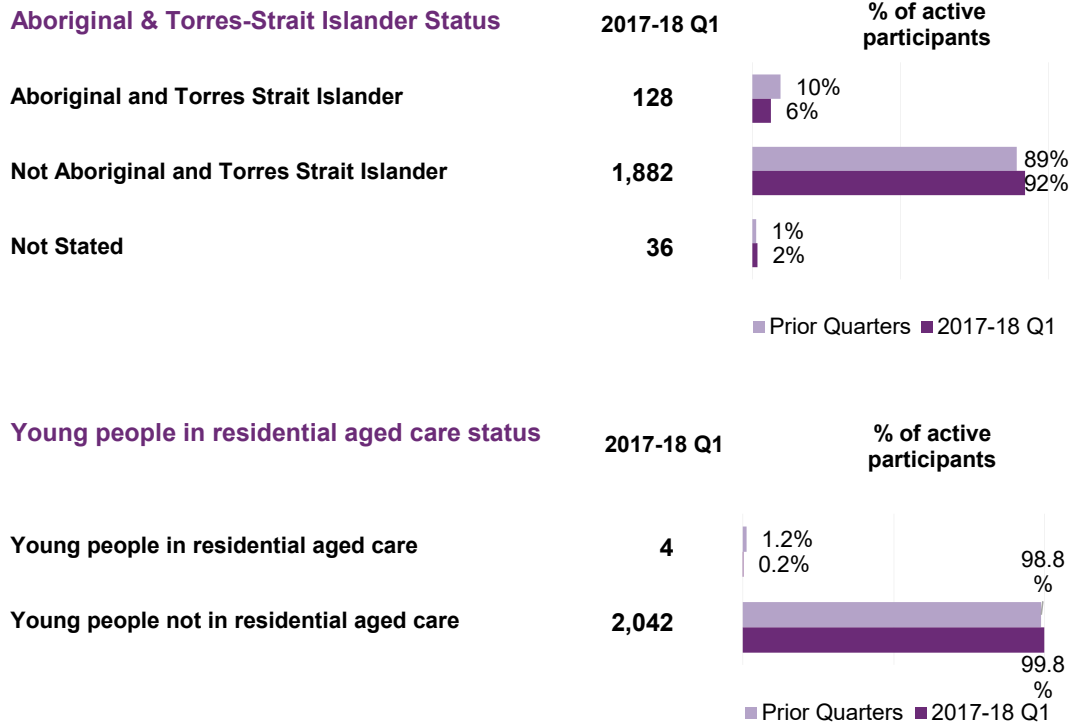

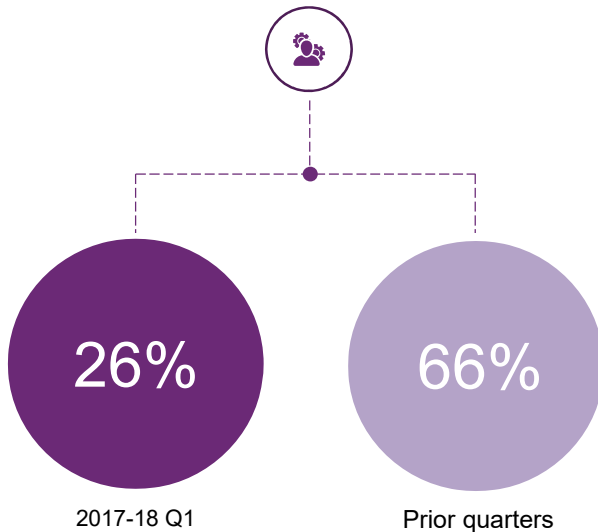
Demographic profile of active participants with a plan approved in the quarter of 2017-18 Q1, compared with plan approvals as at 30 June 2017.



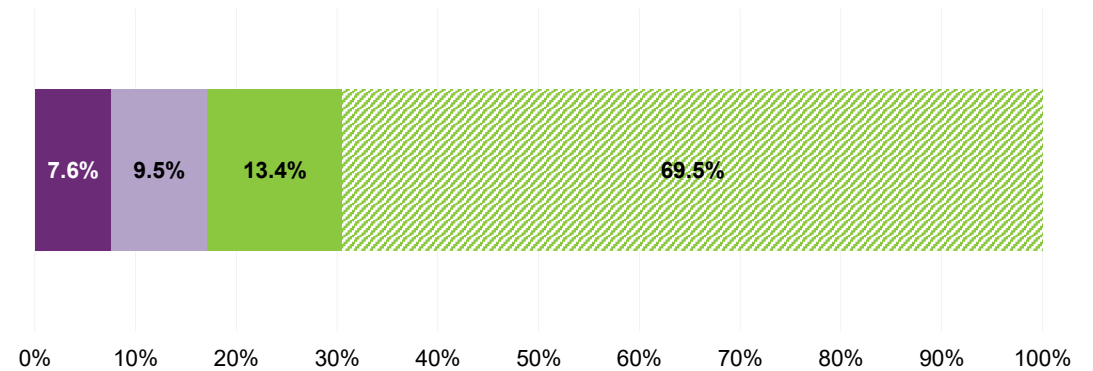
Plan Management Support Co-ordination

The proportion of participants who are fully or partly self-managing their plan was higher in 2017-18 Q1 (20%) compared with the prior quarters of 2016-17 (17%), and 26% of participants who have had a plan approved in 2017-18 Q1 have support coordination in their plan, compared with 66% in prior quarters of 2016-17.

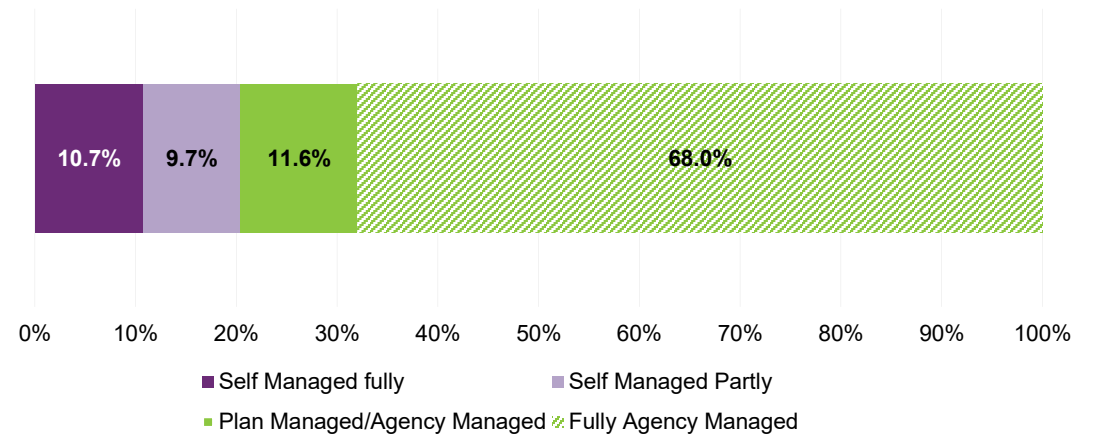
Support Co-ordination

2017-18 Q1



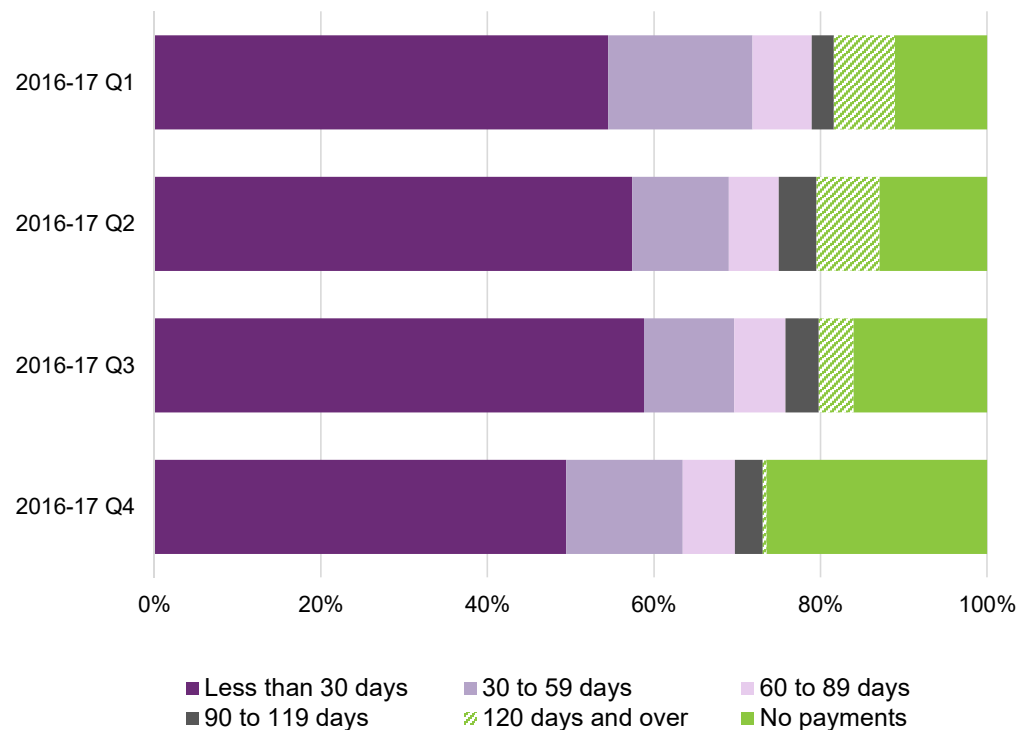
Plan Activation

Plan activation refers to the amount of time between plan approval and the commencement of the participant receiving support.

The percentage of plans activated within 90 days of approval were:

- 79% of plans approved in 2016-17 Q1
- 75% of plans approved in 2016-17 Q2
- 76% of plans approved in 2016-17 Q3
- 70% of plans approved in 2016-17 Q4

Plan activation can only be approximated using data on payments. As there is a lag between when support is provided and payments made, these statistics are likely to be conservative. That is, it is likely that plan activation is faster than presented. Further, in-kind supports have been excluded from the calculation, which further contributes to the conservative figures.

Note: Given that plans approved in 2017-18 Quarter 1 are relatively new, it would be too early to examine the duration to plan activation for these plans and hence these have been excluded from the charts.

Participant Outcomes

Baseline outcome measures were collected from 99% of participants receiving their initial plan since 1 July 2016.

Of participants aged 25 and over:

- 54% choose who supports them
- 71% want more choice and control in their life
- 77% are happy with their home and feel safe or very safe there
- 38% were actively involved in a community group in the past year

For family/carers of children aged 0 to 14:

- 42% have a paid job
- 48% say they are able to work as much as they want
- 47% say they are able to see family and friends as much as they want

Participant Outcomes

Key measures on baseline social, economic and independence outcomes. These will be monitored into the future.

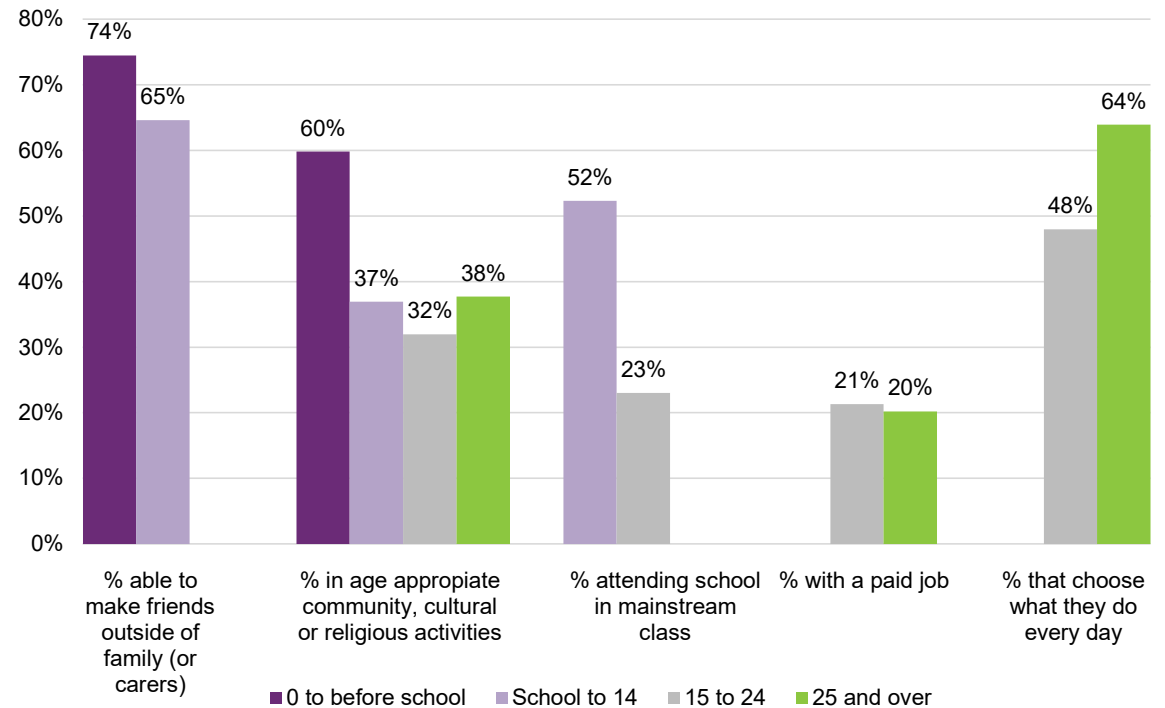
Participants aged 0 to before school:

- 74% were able to make friends outside of family/carers
- 60% involved in age appropriate community, cultural or religious activities (highest compared with other age groups)

Participants aged 25 and over:

- 20% had a paid job
- 64% choose what they do every day

Participant Outcomes

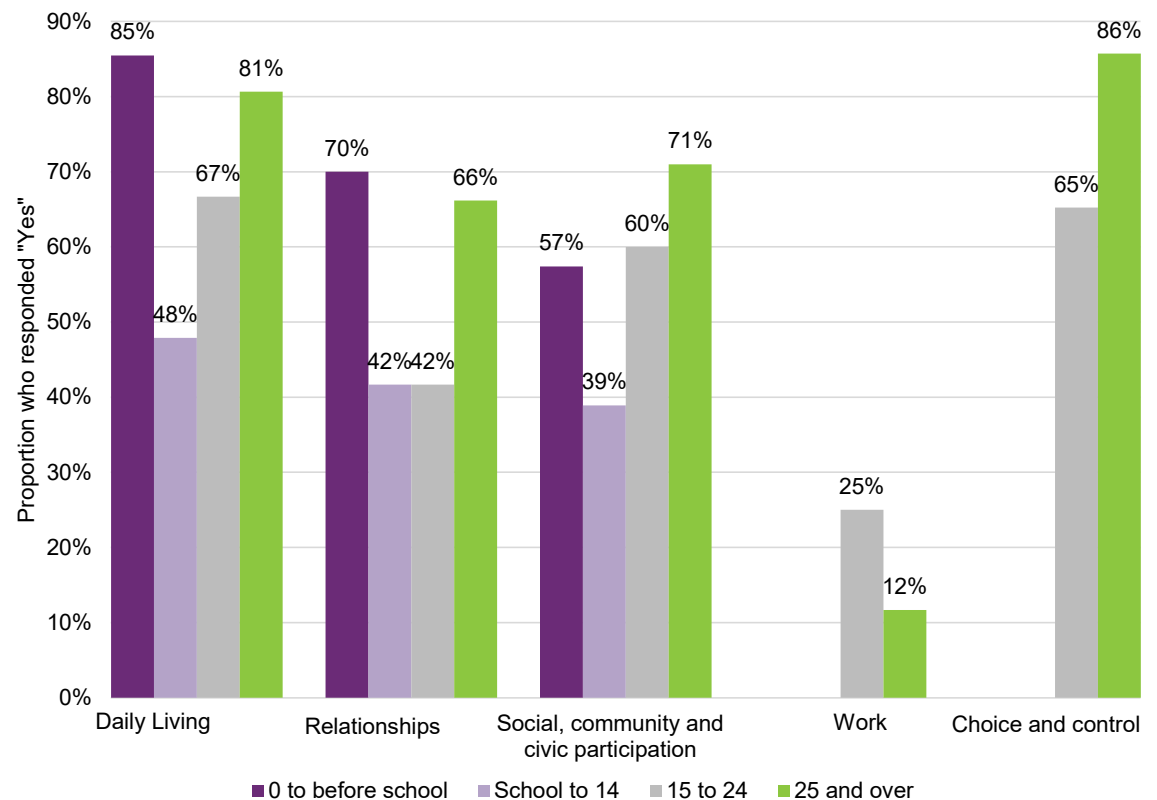
Responses to the “Has the NDIS helped?” questions.

Participants who entered the Scheme in 2016-17 Q1 and had their plan reviewed in 2017-18 Q1 were asked questions about whether the NDIS had helped them.

Percentage of participants responding “Yes” were:

- Higher for 0 to school age participants, particularly for daily living (85%)
- Lower for the school to 14 age group
- Higher for older adult age group than for the younger adult age group

“Has the NDIS helped?” questions

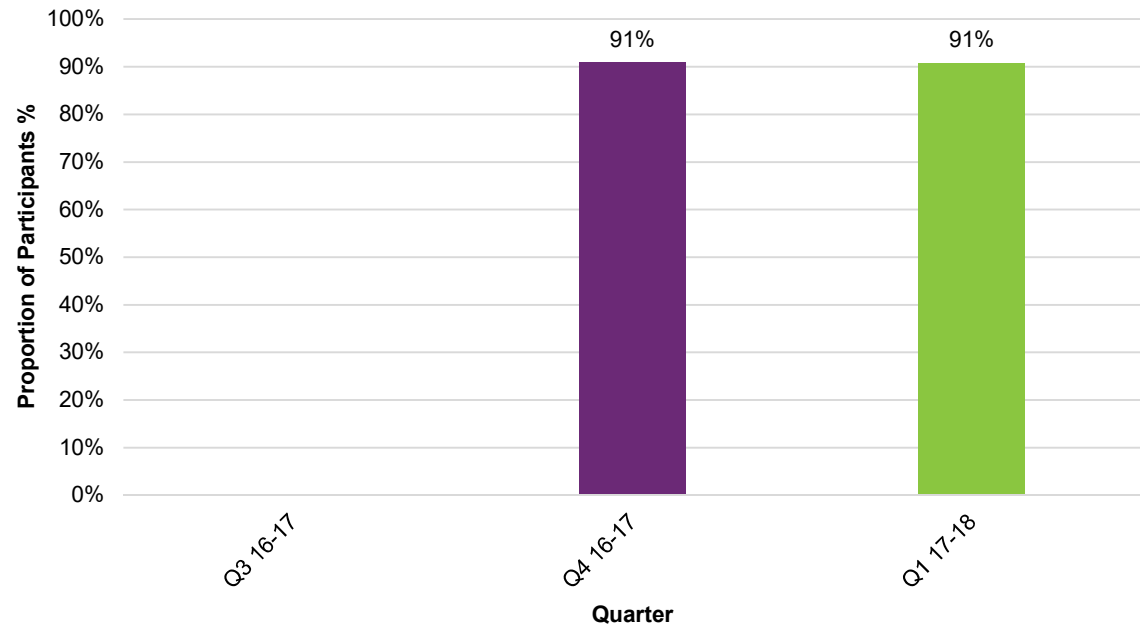


Participant Satisfaction

91% of participants rated their satisfaction with the Agency planning process as either good or very good in the current quarter. This has remained the same since the last quarter. Data collection on participant satisfaction in Queensland only commenced from 2016-17 Q3.

The Participant Pathway Review aims to improve the participant experience.

Committed Supports and Payments

Both committed and paid supports to participants are increasing in line with the growing scheme.

To date funding committed to participants with an approved plan amounts to \$663.4 million (including support periods in the future), of which \$169.6 million has been paid.

The \$663.4 million committed support includes \$197.8 million of supports in respect of prior financial years, \$442.5 million of supports in respect of 2017-18[^] and \$23.1 million of supports in respect of later years*.

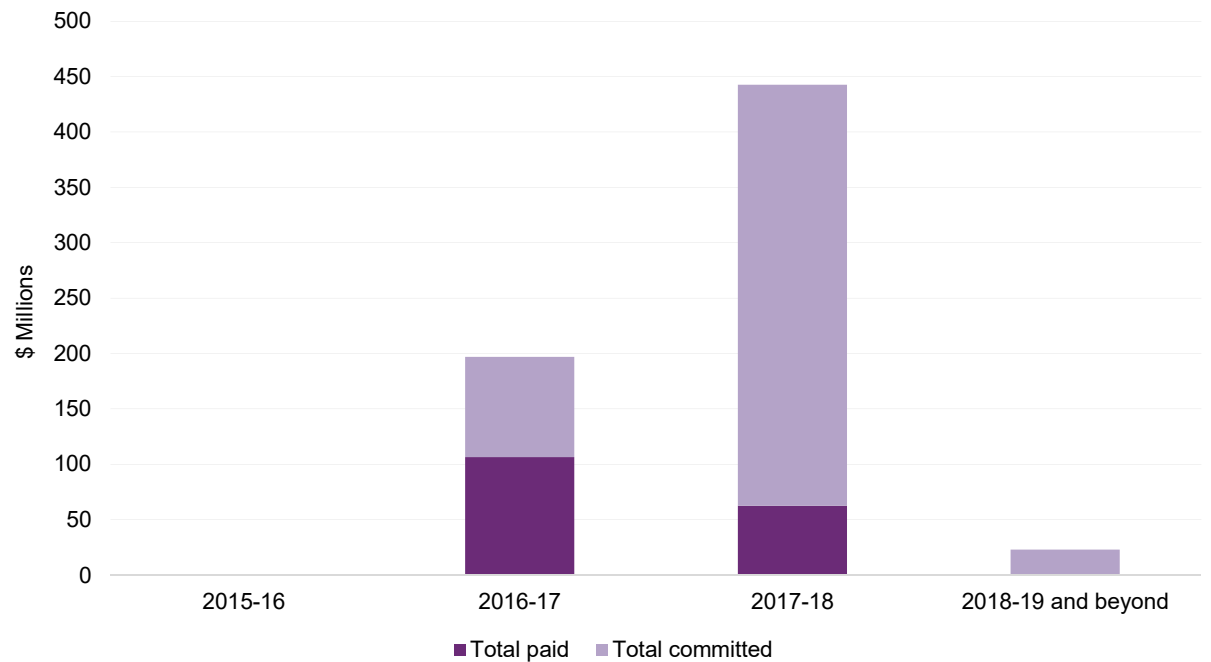

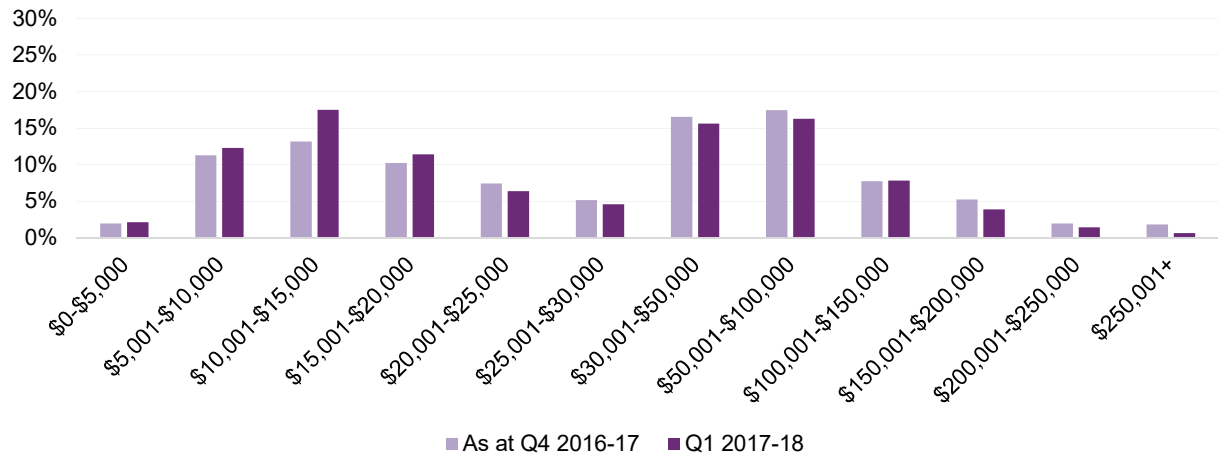
A higher proportion of initial plan approvals in 2017-18 Q1 have average annualised committed supports lower than \$20,000 compared with participants who entered in prior quarters when participants with shared supported accommodation (SSA) supports are included.

This is also the case when SSA participants are excluded.

Distribution of average annualised committed supports by cost band (excluding SSA)

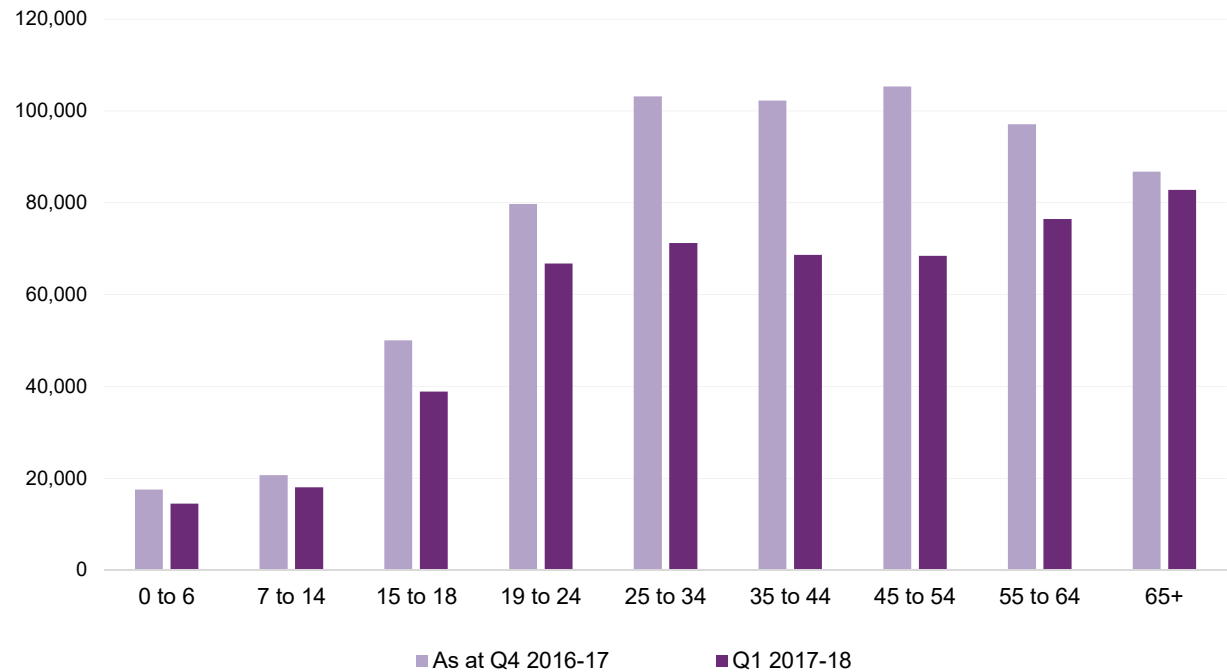


Committed Supports and Payments

Average annualised committed supports increase steeply up to age 25, stabilises to age 55 and then decreases at older ages.

Average annualised committed supports has decreased in the current quarter for participants at all ages, with the largest reduction is at age 45 to 54. This is likely to reflect the phasing schedules outlined in the bilateral agreements.

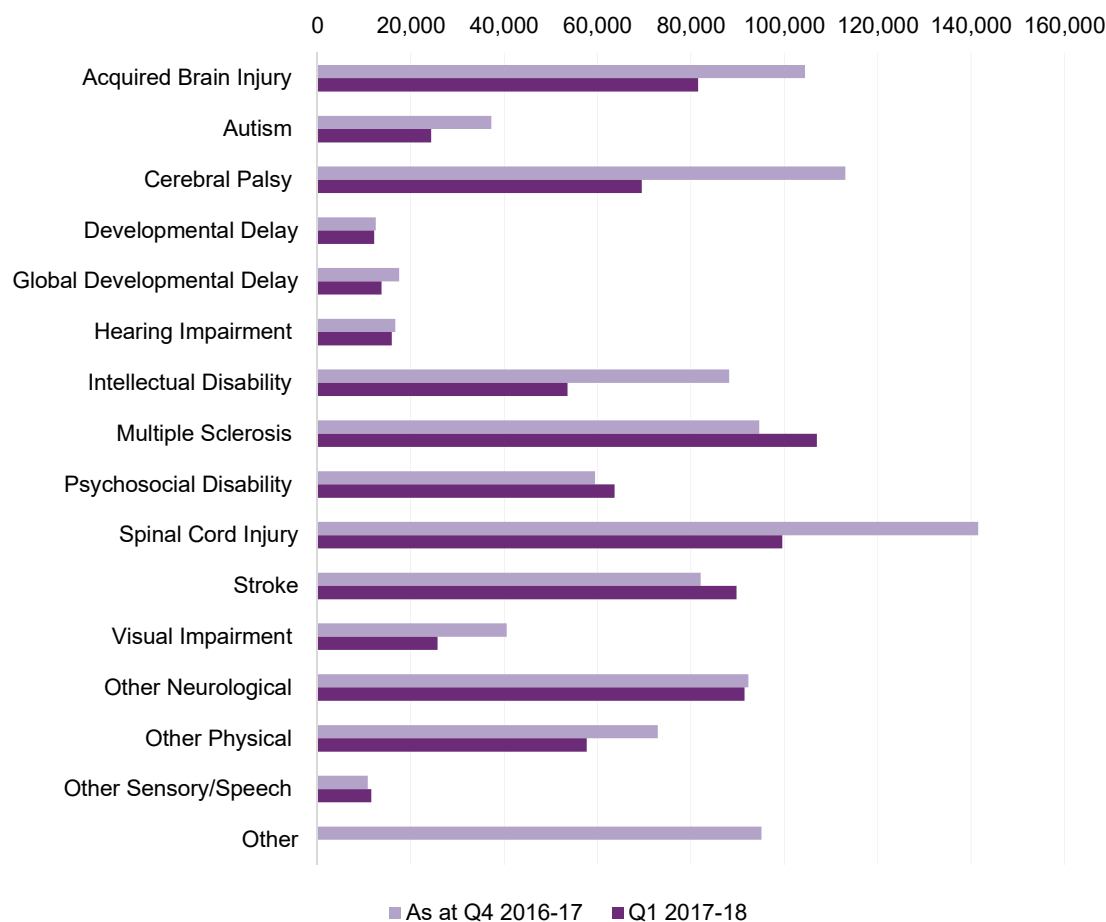
Committed Supports and Payments

Participants with Spinal Cord Injury, Cerebral Palsy and Acquired Brain Injury have the highest average annualised committed supports while participants with Other Sensory/Speech, Developmental Delay and Hearing Impairment have the lowest average annualised committed supports.

Participants with an initial plan approval in 2017-18 Q1 had lower average annualised committed supports across a range of disability types when compared with participants who entered in prior quarters.

This is reflective of the high number of children who entered in the September 2017 quarter and the phasing schedules outlined in the bilateral agreements.

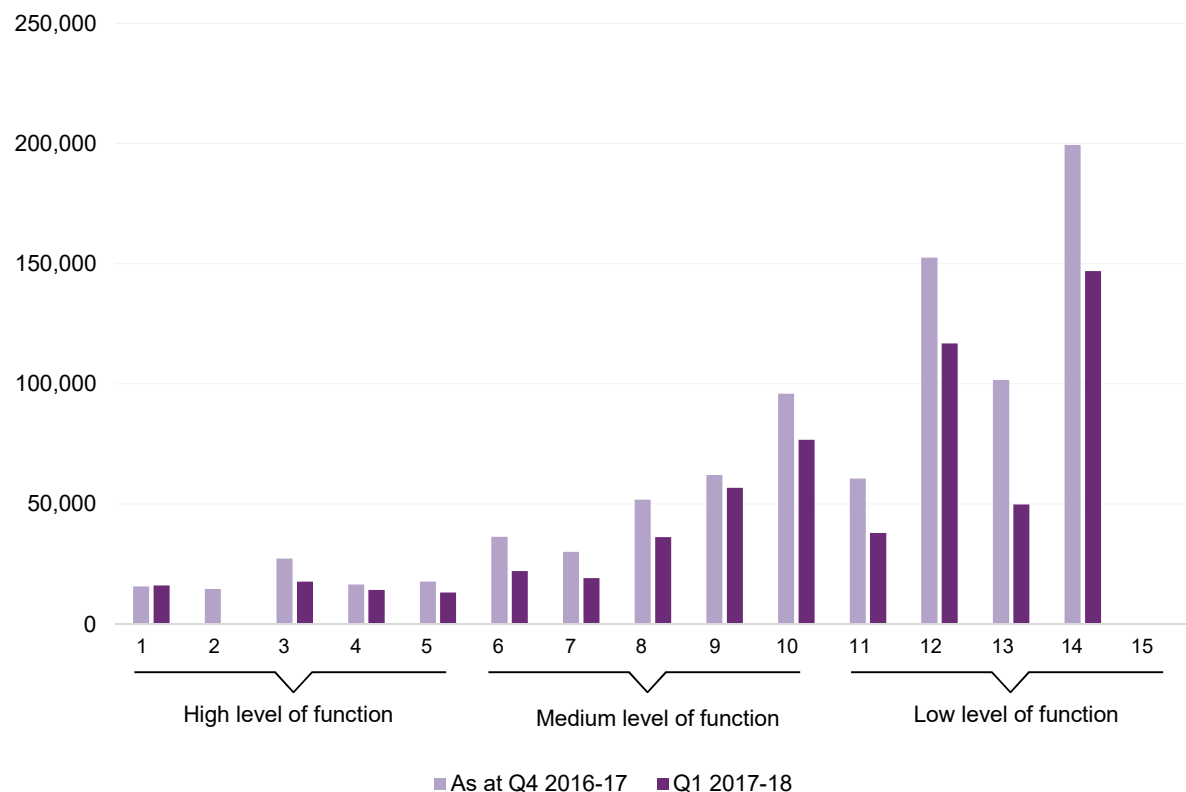
Committed Supports and Payments

The average annualised committed supports generally increase for participants with lower levels of function.

The average annualised committed supports for participants with an initial plan approval in 2017-18 Q1 is lower compared with participants who entered in prior quarters for participants across low, medium and high levels of function.

This is reflective of the high number of children who entered in the September 2017 quarter and the phasing schedules outlined in the bilateral agreements.

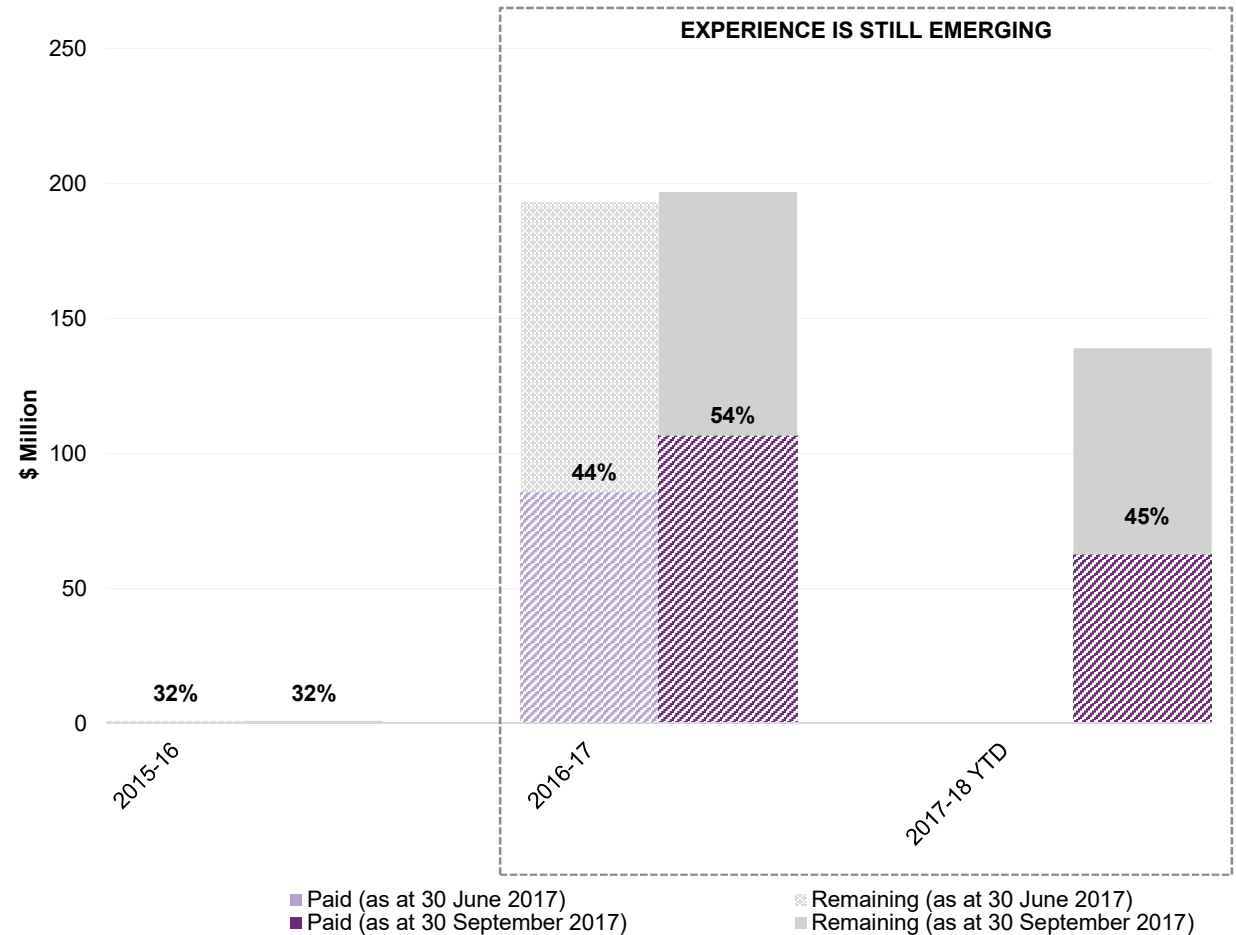
Committed Supports and Payments

Utilisation of committed supports by year that the support was expected to be provided as at 30 June 2017, compared with 30 September 2017.

As there is a lag between when support is provided and when it is paid, the utilisation in 2016-17 and 2017-18 will increase, the latter significantly so.

The utilisation of committed supports has increased for supports provided in 2016-17. This is due to payments in 2017-18 Q1 for supports which were provided during 2016-17.

Providers and Markets

The scale and extent of the market continues to grow, with a 26% increase in the number of providers during the quarter to 1,875.

Providers and Markets

This section contains information on registered service providers and the market, with key provider and market indicators presented.

Provider registration

- To provide supports to NDIS participants, a service provider is required to register and be approved by the NDIA.
- Providers register with the NDIA by submitting a registration request, indicating the types of support (registration groups) they are accredited to provide.
- Providers are approved to deliver disability supports and services to participants of the NDIS if they have at least one registration group approved.

How providers interact with participants

- NDIS participants have the flexibility to choose the providers who support them.
- Providers are paid for disability supports and services provided to the participants.

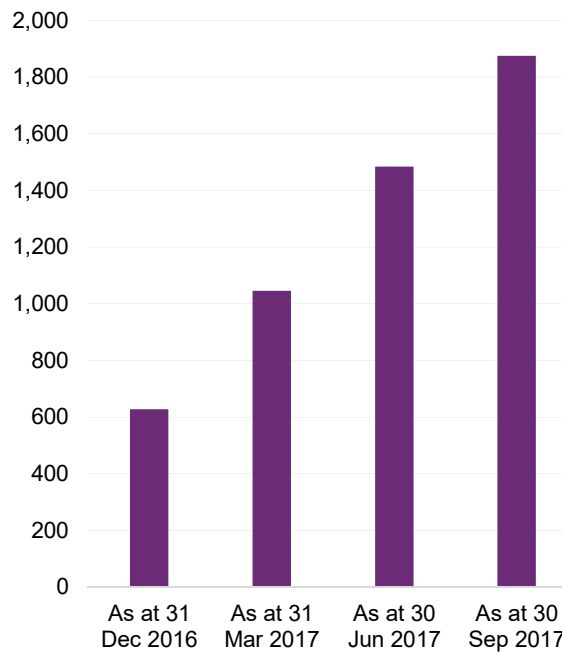
Providers and Markets

As at 30 September 2017, there were 1,875 registered service providers of which 568 were individual/sole trader operated business while the remaining 1,307 providers were registered as a company or organisation.

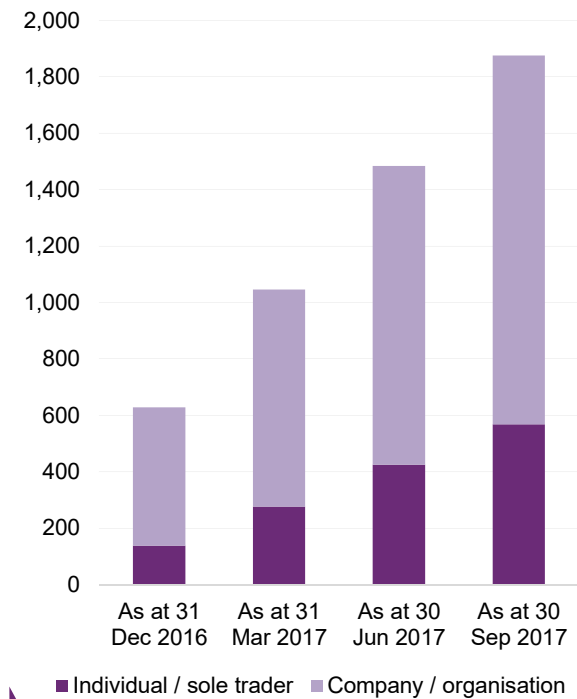

Type of provider



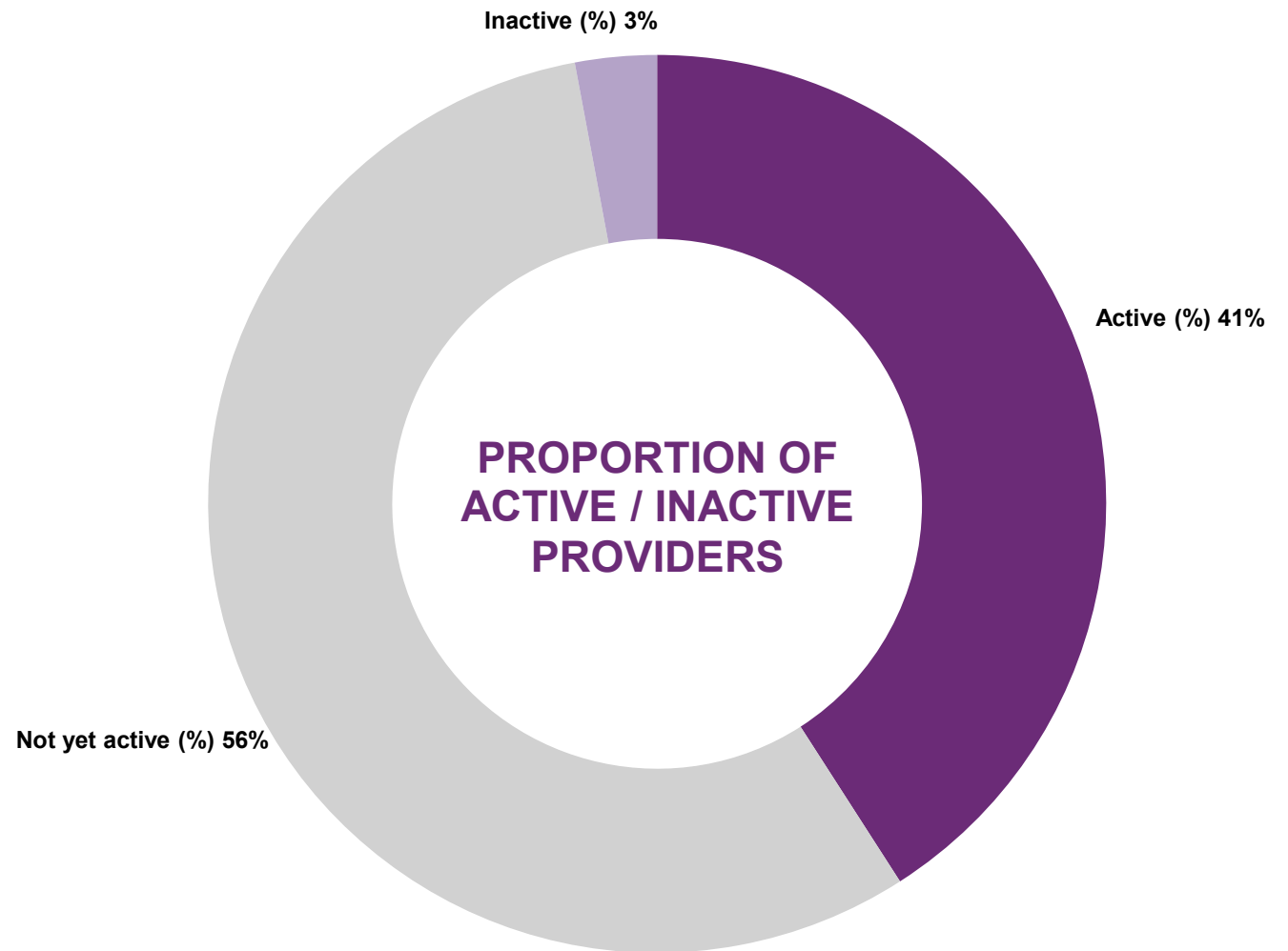
30% of approved service providers are individual/sole traders.

Providers and Markets

Change in the activity status of providers.

As at 30 September 2017, 41% of providers were active in the last quarter, 56% were yet to have evidence of activity and 3% were inactive. Of the overall stock of providers, 329 providers began delivering new supports in the quarter.

NUMBER OF PROVIDERS DELIVERING NEW SUPPORTS



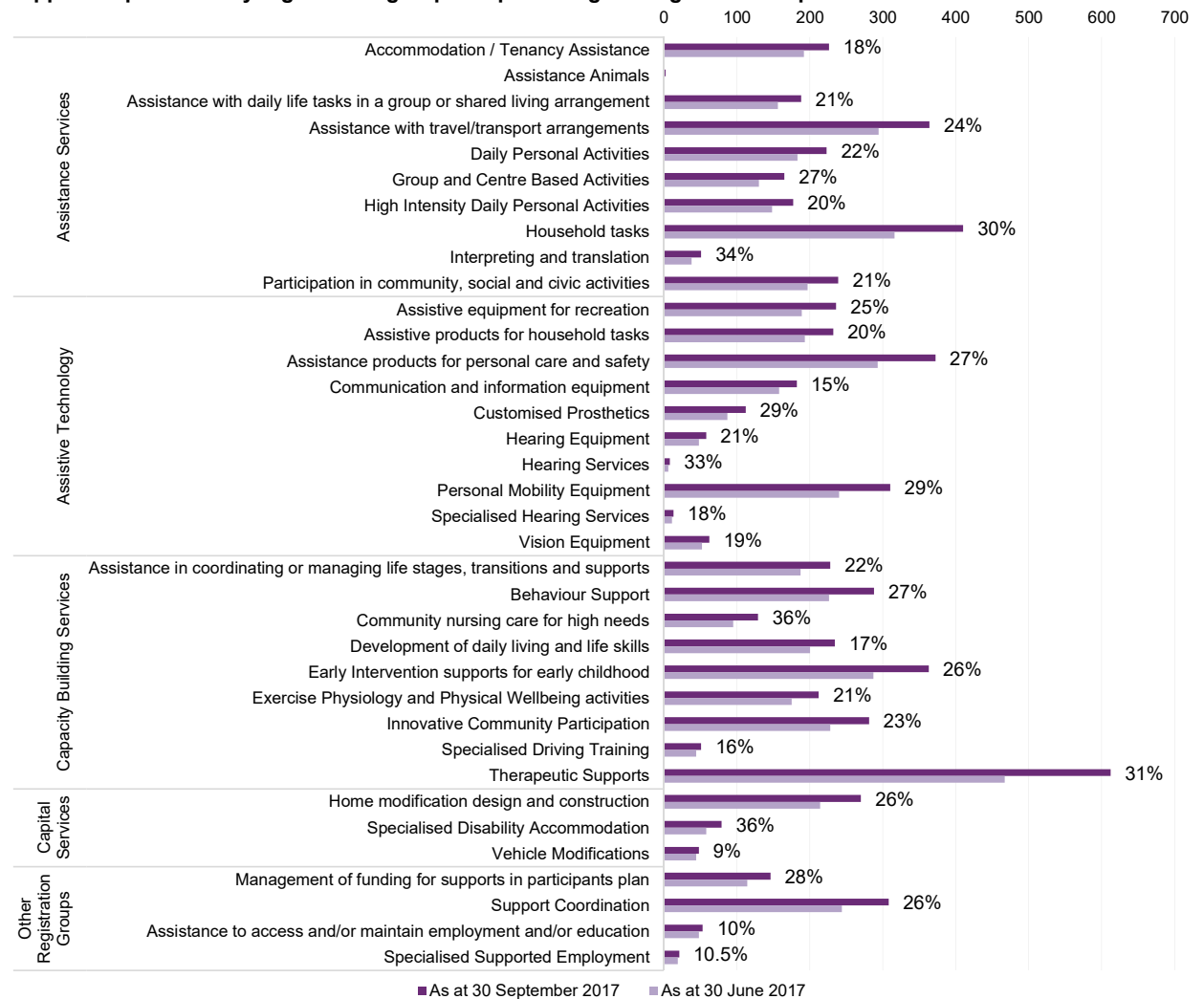
Registration groups

The increase in approved providers from 30 June 2017 to 30 September 2017 varies by registration group.

Therapeutic Supports has the highest number of approved service providers and has seen a 31% increase since the previous quarter.

The largest percentage increase in approved providers was for the Specialised Disability Accommodation registration group in the quarter, increasing from 58 as at 30 June 2017 to 79 as at 30 September 2017. This was followed by Community nursing care for high needs, Interpreting and translation and Hearing Services.

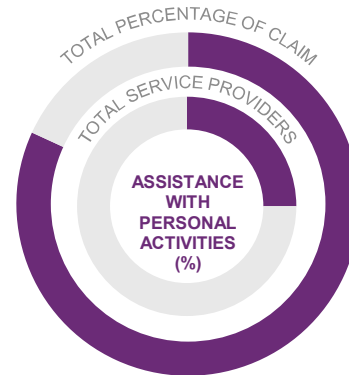
Approved providers by registration group and percentage change over the quarter



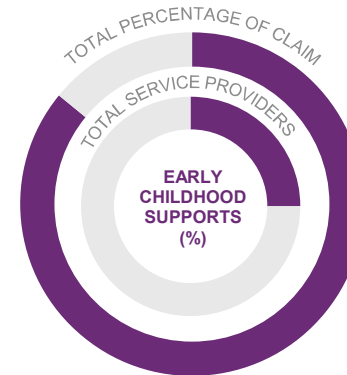
Market share of top providers

25% of service providers received 80-90% of the dollars paid for major registration groups.

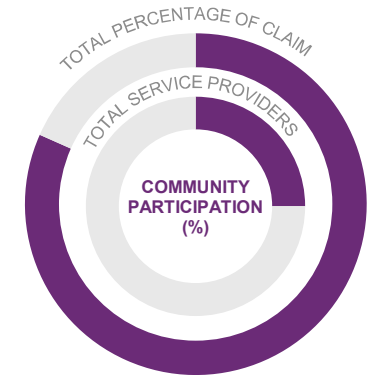
Market share of the top 25% of providers by registration group.



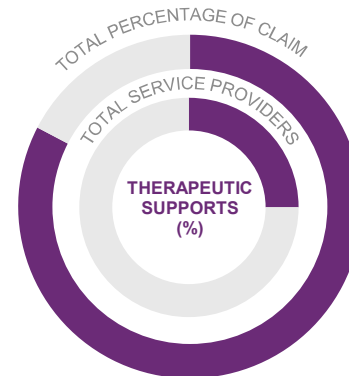

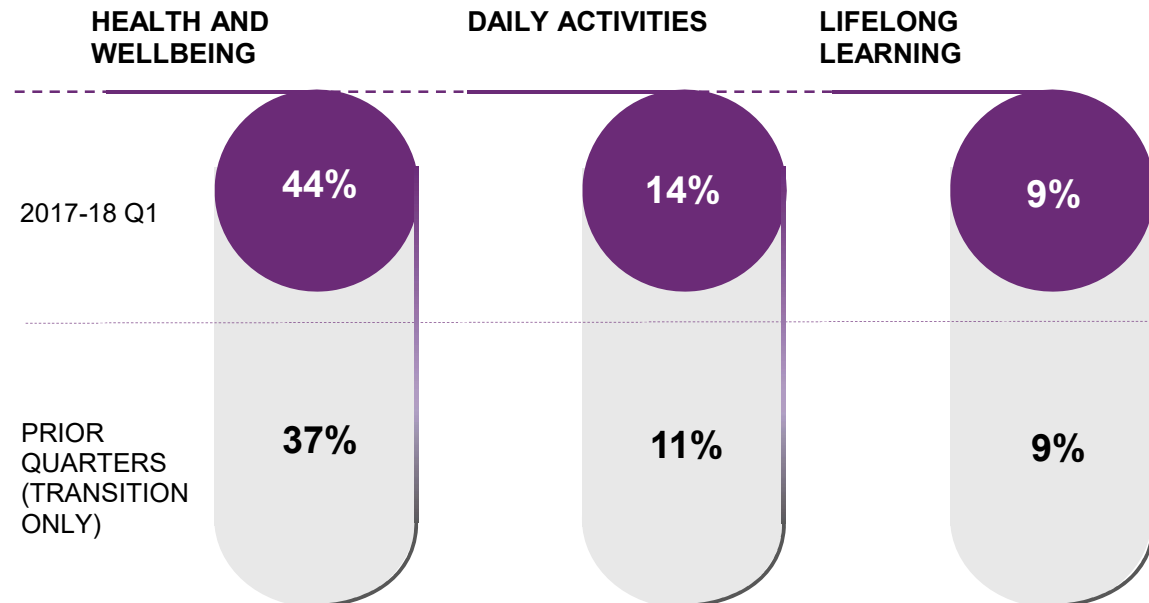
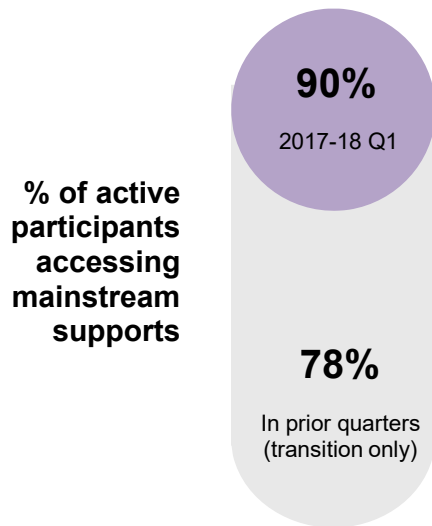
Information, Linkages and Capacity Building was covered in the national version of the COAG Quarterly Performance Report.

Mainstream Interface

The proportion of participants entering in the current quarter accessing mainstream services is higher compared to prior quarters.

Mainstream Interface

90% of active participants with a plan approved in 2017-18 Q1 access mainstream services, an increase from prior quarters. Participants are accessing mainstream services predominantly for health and wellbeing, daily activities and lifelong learning.
